Combines Investigation Act.

In inviting a consideration of the House to the second reading of this Bill, it may be well to preface my remarks upon its provisions by a word or two as to the epirit in which it has been conceived, its relation to legislation enactments on the subject of combines in this and other countries, and the purpose ferwhich it is hoped the measure may serve. A word, too, as to the sniftcance of its introduction at the present time may not be out of place.

It is not going too far to assert that there is not, at the present time, a subject of so much concern to so many people in this country and on this continent, as the increase in the cost of living which has taken place in recent years.
