Directly and indirectly through hospital maintenance, taxation, lost time and postponable death, sickness costs the citizens of Canada approximately one billion dollars annually. That means \$100.00 per person -- \$400.00 for the average family of four people - each and every year. An appalling cost and a terrible waste, because most of it is preventable.

Strangely enough, large sums of money are provided for the building and maintenance of hospitals and institutions for sick people. But expenditures for the prevention of sickness are almost ignored.

For instance your Government annually spends less than \$1.00 per person for prevention in spite of the fact that illness costs \$100.00 per person -- money largely expended on cure. And bear in mind that the money your Government spends whether on prevention or cure comes out of your pocket in taxes.

How can this situation be corrected? In just one way. The public interest must be aroused to the need for a proper expenditure on health conservation. Health education is essential to that end. What public opinion demands - the Government will supply.
