3688—STEVENSON, ANDREW—English and Writing Master, 1884-90—A Canadian, born at Markham, Ont., December, 1856. He received his education at Markham, Whitby and University College; B.A., University of Toronto, 1883 (honors in mental and moral science, logic and civil polity). From 1891-6 he acted as principal of Arthur High School, later following his profession at Woodstock and Stratford; member of the Faculty of Education, Queen's University, Kingston, 1908, and since that time has been at the Normal School, London, Ont. 3689—JACKSON, WILLIAM S.—First Classical Master, U.C.C., 1891-197—Mr. Jackson, who was also vice-principal of the college, was born in England and educated at Rugby and University of London (B.A.) From 1877-80 he was junior assistant master in the School and Boarding House at U.C.C.; third classical master of the Eastern Houses, 1880-91, and dean of Residence from the latter year until 1895. 3691—FRASER, WILLIAM H.—Modern Language Master, U.C.C., 1884-87—From 1880-83 he was assistant master and resident master in the boarding house. He was born at Bond Head, Ont., 1853, son of Rev. Wm. F. Fraser, D.D.; educated at Bradford High School; B.A., University of Toronto, 1880 (gold medal modern languages). Mr. Fraser was successively lecturer, associate professor and professor of Italian and Spanish, Toronto University. He was joint author, with Prof. Squair, of the High School French Grammar, and with Prof. Van der Smissen, of the High School German Grammar. He died at York Mills, 28th Dec., 1916. 3692—BROCK, HENRY—Master of the Junior Forms, U.C.C., Toronto, 137-91—He was born 3rd June, 1852, in Essex County, Eng.; educated in Derbyshire. In 1873-4 was assistant master Hellmuth College, London, Ont. Later he became master of the Junior Forms, U.C.C., and from 1882-91 acted as a house master. Mr. Brock still (1917) resides in Toronto. 3693—CONNON, CHARLES WALKER, LL.D.—English Classical Master, U.C.C., 1860-72—Prepared by a tutor, he entered Marischal College, Aberdeen, and obtained his M.A. degree in 1834. He then filled various educational appointments in England and Scotland. In 1850 the degree of LL.D. was conferred by Aberdeen University, and the same year he was appointed "senior educational instructor" at the Royal Naval School, Greenwich, which position he resigned to come to Canada. While in England he did a good deal of writing and lecturing on current events, and, in collaboration with Mrs. Connon, wrote "Connon's English Grammar" and a text-book on "Paradise Lost." After leaving U.C.C. he did some journalistic work, but spent most of his time in study. He was born in Aberdeen, 9th April, 1815, and died at Hamilton, Ont., April, 1883.
