STEEL TRUST IN CANADA,

PLANT TO BE ESTABLISHED AT PORT COLBORNE.

Power From Niagara Falls—Harbor and Docks on the Welland Canal and Lake Erie—Mr. Louis F. Heyd Interested.

Buffalo, N.Y., July 8.—A special to The Evening News from New York says:—The officials of the United States Steel Corporation to-day announced that work will be begun shortly on the new plant of that company at Port Colborne, Ont., where a large tract of land has been acquired for that purpose. Concessions from the Dominion Government have been secured for the dredging of an immense basin or harbor at the junction of the Welland Canal and Lake Erie, which will be of sufficient size to harbor the sea-going vessels of the company's fleet.
An option has been secured for one of the Niagara Falls Power Company's four thousand horsepower of electrical power. It is proposed to erect a great industrial city there, and to manufacture all of the steel product that will be sold in Canada and throughout the world outside the United States. The new plant will not compete with the American plant of the company for the United States trade, which will be served from the present plants of the company at Carnegie, Pittsburgh and other domestic points. Threatened tariff legislation in England and the British possessions throughout the world and the proposed ship canal from Port Colborne to the Atlantic Ocean are said to be the actuating motives for the new plant.

SOLDIERS SHOOT RIOTERS.

To Save Sixteen Negro Prisoners at Evansville.

Evansville, Ind., July 8.—Six shot dead and twenty-five injured, four fatally, is the outcome of the race riots that have caused a reign of terror in this city during the past four days. On Monday the Evansville Company of Indiana National Guard, assisted by 200 special deputy sheriffs, sworn in during the day, while guarding the county jail, in which were sixteen negro prisoners, poured a deadly volley of buckshot and bullets into a crowd of several thousand people, led by a hundred armed rioters, who were breaking through the back and front gates, accompanied by stones and missiles. When the smoke cleared away thirty-one wounded and dead bodies lay on the pavements. There is a contention as to who fired first, the soldiers or the rioters. That the troops were fired on is proved by the fact that of the fallen four were members of the company. Their wounds were slight.

Following are the dead and fatally wounded: The dead—Eli Ward Schiff, painter, top of head blown off; Hazel Allman, 15 years old, shot in the back; Augustus, age 19, bullet wound in breast; Ed. Ruhl, age 23, laborer, shot through body and head and killed instantly; Fred Kappler, age 15, shot in the side; unknown man, middle aged, shot in the back. Fatally wounded—John Barnett, shot through the right lung; Calvin Hawkins, shot in the abdomen, finger shot off; John Geil, shot in the back; Ernest Walters, shot in the back.

At 9 o'clock at night the mob gradually became more excited, its manifestations of uneasiness more frequent, and at 10 o'clock it was seen that nothing could prevent an assault on the jail. At 10:30 the rioters pressed slowly forward, and innocent onlookers followed. Slowly they forced the militiamen back toward the jail, until an alley between Division street and the stone building was reached. The leaders, with a bicycle in their front as a shield to the bayonets of the soldiers, stoned the jail entrance. Captain Blum of the National Guard ordered a charge on the rioters. The crowd was forced back, the soldiers using their bayonets and butts of their guns. Suddenly a rioter fell. Stones and boulders began to fly through the air. A soldier was struck with a rock and fell. A rioter was knocked down with a gun butt and a shot followed. This started a fusillade from the defenders and a scattered fire from the rioters. Fully 300 shots were fired. No one knows where the first shot was fired. The soldiers claim it was the rioters, while the rioters make no claim. The Governor is said to have instructed the authorities not to jeopardize the safety of the jail with half-way measures. The soldiers and deputies fired into the retreating mob of men, who ran into Division street falling, crying and praying. For 15 minutes the firing continued then it ceased. The mob was gone and the soldiers held the place.

GOT OFF BACKWARDS.

Miss Lizzie Burns of Quebec Fatally Injured.

Quebec, July 8.—An accident occurred about 11 o'clock p.m. Monday at Grand Valley, which caused the death of a young woman of 27 years, named Lizzie Burns, daughter of Mr. John Burns, baker, residing at 147 Artillerie street. Miss Burns, in alighting from a street car backwards without waiting for the car to stop, fell, and her head struck the asphalt pavement with great force. The car was immediately stopped, and, as Miss Burns was lying unconscious on the pavement, she was carried to the residence of Geo. Smith. She never recovered consciousness, and died at 12:15 this morning.

Was He Drowned?

Washington, July 7.—Word received in Washington to-day leaves little doubt that Ed. DeLahanty, the famous baseball player, committed suicide or was accidentally drowned at Fort Erie, Ont., on the night of July 2.
