Biography is represented in the *ninth volume* by Dean Stanley's masterly "LIFE OF DR. ARNOLD," the great Head Master of Rugby. The *tenth volume* occupies an entirely different field with Edgar Alian Poe's TALES OF ADVENTURE, MYSTERY, AND IMAGINATION, unsurpassed in their way. A new translation of MOLIERE'S CELEBRATED COMEDIES forms the *eleventh volume*; and in *the twelfth*, the equally celebrated dramatist, novelist, essayist and poet, OLIVER GOLDSMITH, is graphically depicted in the "Life and Times of Goldsmith," by John Forster, the biographer of Charles Dickens.

The thirteenth volume consists of one of the most perfect monographs on a most interesting nation, now becoming gradually Europeanised. E. W. Lane's MANNERS AND CUSTOMS OF THE MODERN EGYPTIANS, before they began to be so transformed, is recognised as a masterpiece. It is lavishly illustrated.

Political Biography is represented by Mr. Torrens's LIFE OF MELBOURNE, wherein the character and influence of that notable statesman are amply elucidated.

Thackeray's Vanity Fair — one of the masterpieces of English fiction—forms the fifteenth volume. The sixteenth and twentieth return to the fertile field of African travel, presenting the celebrated TRAVELS OF DR. H. BARTH IN NORTHERN AND CENTRAL AFRICA. Many of the regions dealt with in the recent Anglo-French Agreement are described in this narrative.

France, in the person of her greatest poet, furnishes the seventeenth volume. The selection from Hugo's POEMS AND TRAGEDIES has been arranged with great care, and the translators include many well-known authors.

The eighteenth volume is a reprint of those volumes of travel, description, and geological observation written by Charles Darwin while he was preparing for his still more famous "Origin of Species." The three volumes on "Coral Reefs," "Volcanic Islands," and "Geological Observations on South America," are here presented in one volumeach book having a separate critical and historical introduction of Professor John W. Judd. F.R.S. late President of the Geological Soc. 4v.

A charming volume of literary biography will be found in the
nineteenth volume, a new edition of LOCKHART'S LIFE OF ROBERT
BURNS. With Mr. John H. Ingram's valuable notes and appendices,
and Carlyle's and Wilson's remarkable essays on Burns, this volume is a
most attractive repertory of Burns lore.

The best collection of light and occasional poetry in the English language forms the twenty-first volume. Lyra Elegantiarum, carefully re-edited and enlarged by Mr. Frederick Locker-Lampson, assisted by Mr. Coulson Kernahan, is a classic of universal acceptability.

The twenty-second volume adds the honoured name of Carlyle to the series, in the shape of his "Sartor Resartus," "Heroes and Hero-Worship," and "Past and Present."

The twenty-third is biography of the best kind, the self-revelation of a man of genius, BENJAMIN FRANKLIN, in his autobiography and letters.

The twenty-fourth volume is a reprint of Beckford's remarkable Oriental romance, Vathek, with his scarcely less remarkable "European Travels," the earlier part reprinted from his suppressed quarto of 1784.

Arrangements have already been made for a succession of volumes in the coming months, which will fully sustain the interest and value of the Minerva Library.
