VALUABLE REMEDY FOR CHILDIANS.—Sunk the net or in the day, thus prepared—In two quarts of water fast boiling, throw two large handfuls of fresh sweet herb, let it boil about twenty minutes, then strain for use. The liquor may be used a second time by boiling up a part of it, so as to bring the whole to a proper warmth—but fresh every night is preferable. This is suitable both for broken and unbroken childiains—a very trifling trial will prove its efficacy.

OIL FOR MAHOAGNY FURNITURE.—Lined oil has a pint—vinegar a quarter of a pint—about of antimony one ounce; mix in a bottle and shake every time of using. Having carefully dusted the furniture, apply a little of this oil, and rub with a soft linen rag or old silk handkerchief, and it will soon acquire a mirror-like gloss.
