Great Measure Int. oduced by Whitney Government Comes Into Effect on Return to Power

On May 1st, 1914, there was placed on the Statute Books of Ontario the Workmen's Compensation Act. It is admitted on all hands that the Act is the most advanced piece of legislation that has yet been enseted in any province of the Demission, or in any State of the Union, or any of the countries of the Old World.

Some of the salient features of the Act are as follows:-(1). If a workman is injured he is entitled in every case to empensation, unless the righty was caused solely by his serious and wilful misconduct, and

ven where the injury was caused solely by his serious and wilf il misconuct, compensation must still be paid If the injury results in death or serious disablement. (2). There is no waiting period during which no ompensation is payable

It is true that the injury must last nore than seven days, but if it does the compossation doses back to the date of the lajury. In most states and countries a definite period, generally of at least

wo weeks, is fixed during which no compensation is payable... (3). All law suits are done away with. The workman simply sends hi claim to the Board. The Board rond awards the compensation without ever secing the workman or his en compensation to pay costs.

(4). The compensation enanot begannisheed or attached by a creditor.
