 and production in Western Ontario. This meeting would therefore respectfully urge that the Government of the Province of Ontario, giving due consideration to the situation both financially and otherwise created by the present world-wide war hasten to carry to completion the proposed Provincial Highways scheme, and that the first highway to be constructed under said proposed scheme shall be one running from London through Ingersoll, Woodstock and Brantford to Hamilton, and at that point connecting with the existing Provincial highway leading to the City of Toronto and the proposed Provincial highway to Niagara Falls, and that the Provincial Government do adopt the Highway bill by the Toronto and Hamilton Highway Commission and the proposed highway from Hamilton to Niagara Falls as a part of said Provincial Highways System.
 The composition of the committee to press the claims of the central route before the Government, also gave rise to further discussion. One of the Mayors wished the committee to be composed of certain mayors that he named. On this being objected to, the motion was altered to read all the mayors and wardens between London and Niagara Falls. Ald. Dowling moved an amendment, that each committee present should name its own representative on this Executive Committee. The Woodstock representatives supported this resolution, but as nearly all the representatives had left the meeting except the mayors, Ald. Dowling's resolution was voted down, and the Mayors and Wardens were appointed the Executive committee, not including those east of Hamilton, with Mayor Burgoyne of St. Catharines as Chairman and T. 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SYNOPSIS OF CANADIAN WEST LAND RIGHTS ACT
 The sole head of a family, or over 18 years old, may homestead a section of available Dominion Lands, Saskatchewan or Alberta, must appear in person at the district office, or by proxy made at any Dominion Lands Agent Sub-Agency, on certain conditions.
 Duties—Six months residence on the land, cultivate 20 acres, at least 80 acres, on certain conditions. A homesteader may live nine miles of his homestead on a habitable house is required and residence is performed in the year.
 Live stock may be substituted on certain conditions.
 In certain districts a homestead good standing may preempt a section alongside his homestead, \$3.00 per acre.
 Duties—Six months residence of three years after entry, or patent, also 60 acres extra. Pre-emption patent may be obtained as homesteader, but on conditions.
 A settler who has exhausted a stand right may take a purchase in certain districts. Price, \$10.00 per acre.
 Duties—Must reside six months of three years, cultivate 20 acres, a house worth \$300.
