THE SITUATION.

The British have evacuated other portions of Flanders and the evident intention is an effort to force through this territory to the Channel ports. The Times and other British newspapers have given the intimation that this design may succeed, but that even so the incident will not mark an absolute German triumph. It is the general anticipation that somewhat of a lull in the fighting is merely the prelude to another Teuton attack in force.

An unconfirmed report has been received of another revolution in Petrograd with the son of the former Czar proclaimed as Emperor and Grand Duke Michael as Regent. Washington is of opinion that the news has been disseminated by Germany as an excuse for a still more vigorous exercise of the iron hand in the new Republic.

Apprehension is said to be growing in Germany over the tremendous price which the Fatherland has had to pay in men in connection with recent operations.

In the Transcaucasia the Turks have scored a notable success in faulty surroundings there cannot be capturing the fortress of Kars, and over eight hundred guns.

The total casualties in the Zeebrugge, Ostend attack were 588. Of these 188 were killed or died of wounds.
