SCARES MANY

It Drops Into The Sea Off The Long Island Coast

Residents Thought the End Black French Venetian Of The World Had Come

New York, Aug. 20.—At 6 o'clock Sunday evening an immense meteor, apparently about 75 feet in circumference, fell into the sea, about a mile off the Amaganzett, L. I., life-saving station. First a rear was heard, and an instant later a great stream of fire seemed to come down from the clouds and plunge into the sea in the wake of the meteor. The meteor fell into the water with a noise as of a mighty boiler letting off steam.

Great waves rolled in upon the

Great waves rolled in upon the beach. Part of the bathing pavilion was washed away, and along with it several fishermen's huts. Much damage was done to property abutting the waterfront. Some persons thought the strange incident marked the end of the world. Even the old fishermen, used as they are to facing death at sea, were terrified, and not for an hour or more did the excitement quiet down.

Capt. George Green, who was in command of a vessel in the harbor of St. Pierre, when Mount Pelee blew its head off and destroyed that city, was sitting on the waterfront when the meteor fell. He declared nothing had ever frightened him so much except the Mount Pelee disaster.

The meteor apparently fell vertically. From the time the noise was first heard until it plunged into the sea was probably three-quarters of a minute. After the disturbance had subsided hundreds of dead fish were found on the shore. These were gathered up by boys and peddled by them.

Like an Earthquake.

Middlebury, Vt., Aug. 20.—Prof. Sheldon of the Brooklyn Politicnic Institute went to Bristol Notch yesterday to investigate the fall of an unusually large meteor, which was observed by many people throughout Addison Sunday morning. Those who saw it fall say it was of unusual brilliancy and size. The effect of its fall was like that of an earthquake, the country within several miles of the socne of its landing experiencing shocks, which caused damage to many hences.
