Presbyterians Embrace Both Anglicans and Baptist.

General Assembly at London Votes For by 156 to 8, and Afterwards Carries It Unanimously - Several Amendments Proposed and Voted Down-Alexander Warden Is Treasurer.

London, June 14.—At the Presbyter-London, June 14.—At the Presbyterian General Assembly yesterday morning, Rev. R. Macbeth of Paris introduced an amendment, when the church thill on debate resumed, the purpose of which was to prevent the report of the committee being sent to the congregations at the present stage.

Dr. Herdman, Calgary, said there was a widespread feeling in the west that union should not be proceeded with.

with.

Rev. J. F. Dustan said it would create internecine strife and civil war.
(Derisive laughter.) There was no necessity to send the report to the churches; they could get all the information needed from the press. To submit the question to the people now would not only be useless, but injurious

The amendment was rejected by 111 ortes to 57.

Dr. W. H. E. McInnes, Kingston, noved that not only should the reports as sent to presbyteries, sessions and

moved that not only should the reports be sent to presbyteries, sessions and congregations, but they should be requested to offer suggestions on the points submitted. The motion was lost.

Union Motion Passes.

The original resolution, which seeks a comprehensive union including both Anglicans and Baptists, was put to the assembly and was accepted, 156 voting for the resolution and 8 against.

In reference to the proposal to invite in the Anglican and Baptist churches, Principal McLaren, Toronto, was in favor of giving the negotiations a wider range, but he did not think it was in harmony with what was due to the other churches to do this without consulting them.

He moved that the union committee be instructed to obtain from the negotiating churches their opinion as to its practicability and desirability before taking any further step in that direction.

After discussion, Dr. McLaren's mo-After discussion, In Medical Strong was rejected.

The original resolution that the Anglicans and Baptists be invited most cordially to take part in the negotiations for union was unanimously car-

ried.

The moderator was appointed a member of the union committee in the foom of the late Dr. Warden.

On the recommendation of the committee the assembly appointed Alexander Warden of Toronto to the office of treasurer, and Dr. Somerville joint clerk to the assembly.

Church Funds on Call.

At the afternoon session Rev. Dr.
Scrimger of Montreal moved that the report of the committee appointing Alex. Warden as treasurer be reconsid-Alex. Warden as treasurer of reconsulered. He got no seconder. He charged that within the year the Presbyterian Church had had \$178,900 out on call loans to Osborne & Francis, brokers, of Toronto. This fact had been brought to the attention of the advisory board by Alex. Warden, and the board had recalled the loans. There were also loans to Dominion Coal Co. for \$5,000, for which \$4,959 was paid. A loan on a mortgage for \$2,425 and on another for
