DANGER IN HYPNOTISM.

ndon Medical Expert Talks of Experiments.

The advantages and dangers of hypnotism as a means of treating disease formed the subject of a notable lecture accompanied by some remarkable experiments given before the Psycho-Therapeutic Society by Dr. Edwin Ash, for some time demonstrator of physiology and house physician at St. Mary's Hospital.

"In using hypnotism to cure disease."

"In using hypnotism to cure disease," said Dr. Ash, "we at present are toying with a great force which we do not fully understand, and which we cannot entirely control. We certainly cannot control it sufficiently to govern the grosser forms of disease and it is important to remember that nothing can do more harm to psychotherapeutic methods than that one case so treated which should have been treated by surgical means should go wrong.

"Diseases which generally can be in-

"Diseases which generally can be influenced by hypnotism are of a functional order, and not those associated with organic changes. It can, I think, be proved that it is possible by mechanical means and suggestion, without any personal influence, such as magnetism, to mask the conscious mind of the subject and bring out some underlying unconsciousness."

To illustrate the points of his lecture he experimented on a young member of the auxiliary forces. Rapidly putting the subject into a state of hypnosis the youth was told by Ash that he was in the drill-room of his regiment. At the word of command he stood at attention, and went through the actions of loading his rific and firing.

On being told that he must drive his colonel's automobile, the audience being assured he never had driven one, the youth sat in the chair, pulled imaginary starting levers, worked unseen pedals, and occasionally made a movement as if sounding a warning horn. Hypnotism, Ash said, was a great power which could be used with advantage if due care is taken by norn. Farm Work For Prisoners.

Industrial Canada protests against using the labor of prisoners in factory work, as disorganizing to trade. The trades unions adopt the same attitude, but from another cause. Both would agree to having the prisoners employed in agricultural labor. Manitoba Penitentiary, at Stony Mountain, about fourteen miles from Winnipeg, is one of the few prisons in the world where agricultural work has been tried and the experiment has been most successful.

Not only is farm work healthful, but it also puts men in the position of more readily starting out for themselves when they leave the prison than any other trade. "Where did you learn work last?" or "Where did you learn your trade?" is the question which so often spells despair to the discharged convict trying to start life again, whereas with the help of his friends he could in most cases get a start on a prairie farm and thus have a good chance of living down his past. Besides that the Warden of Manitoba Penitentiary is authority for the statement that the life in contact with nature, the handling of teams, the feeding and care of live stock, bring out the better qualities of a man in a way that no technical knowledge of the working of a machine ever could. Manitoba penitentiary has a large farm, and generally raises more wheat than is required for flour in the prison, and often has pork and other products to sell.
