OFFICERS ELECTED

Meeting of Shareholders of Windsor Essex and Lake Shore Ry. Co. Held on Saturday

A meeting of the shareholders of the Windsor, Essex & Lake Shore Rapid Railway Company was held at Windsor on Saturday, all the shareholders being present.

The following officers were elected:
President—John Figgott.
Vice-President—W. L. Wilson, Port Huron.
Second Vice-President—Thomas E. Robinson, Detroit.
Third Vice-President—Dr. James Brien, Essex.
Secretary—Walter T. Figgott.
Treasurer—W. C. Crawford, Tilbury.

These, with the Hon. Mr. Elliott, Matthew Wilson, K. C., and G. Stevenson are the directors.

The line is progressing at a rapid rate towards Leamington, and on Saturday over a mile of new track was laid. The Keystone Construction Company are pushing the line forward as fast as possible and hope to reach Leamington by the early summer.

Nearly 200 men are at work and the track is being put down at a good pace. The line to Chatham will be commenced as soon as the Leamington track is finished.

The Company have located their offices in the Living Block, over the Traders' Bank, in Windsor. W. E. McKeough and W. R. Phillimore, of Chatham, attended the meeting on Saturday and both these gentlemen are largely interested in the enterprise.

TROOPS ATTACKED

Col. Mansell's Quickness Averts Calamity From "Crescent Formation"—60 Zulus Were Killed.

Durban, May 7.—Col. Mansell's column, which is pursuing the Zulu rebels under Chief Bambata, was attacked yesterday by a large body of Zulus while descending a precipitous hill near the grave of Chief Cetewayo.

Sixty Zulus were killed. Col. Mansell had three men wounded.

Mansell was engaged in a reconnaissance from Fort Yoland.

He was co-operating with other columns in expelling the rebels from the forest with a view to cutting Bambata off from escape.

He thought the Zulu attackers were Bambata's men.

They numbered altogether over a thousand men and attempted to employ the crescent formation adopted in the Zulu war, and only Col. Mansell's prompt disposition of his forces prevented disaster.

The Zulus displayed desperate fury. They were armed with rifles and assegais and evidently had been drugged by witch doctors, who pretend to be able to render them impervious to bullets.

A SHERRING GRANT

Provincial Treasurer Has \$500 in Estimates For Marathon Hero.

Toronto, May 7.—The supplementary estimates of the Provincial Treasurer will be completed on Monday and submitted to the Legislature on Tuesday. They will include a vote of \$500 to William Sherring, the Marathon hero.

Hamilton's Reception of Hero.

Hamilton, May 7.—Hamilton will give Billy Sherring, the Marathon hero, a reception worthy of the occasion. The general committee met Saturday evening and agreed to make an effort to have the hero arrive at the T. H. & B. station at 8:05 in the evening. A procession will be formed and will march to Victoria Park, where the reception will take place and the testimonial presented.

The committee will spend no money on fireworks and as little as possible on hacks, leaving that part of the show for clubs and citizens.

The general committee was divided into several committees and given special work to do. One committee will look after the collection of a suitable testimonial.
