A Word of Caution.

A move, as we believe originating
with the Board of Trade of Kentville,
has been made looking forward to the
holding of an Agricultural Exhibition at
Kentville some time this autumn; in
which the counties of Annapolis and
Hants and the towns of Kentville and
Wolfville are requested to co-operate.
A guarantee from each county and town
to pay a proportionate share of any
deficit, should there be one, is required;
and in case of there being a surplus each
to share the same in proportion. The
history of exhibitions in this Province
goes to show that deficits is the rule, pay-
ing expenses the exception and surplus
almost unknown. This being the case
would it be wise for the towns of Wolf-
ville to obligate itself to pay for that
which could not, in the nature of things
benefit it in the least. Were the exhibi-
tion to be held here no doubt we should
receive much financial benefit therefrom
and our townsmen would probably con-
tribute generously, but being in a neigh-
boring town it not only prevents an in-
crease of trade here, but would naturally
draw much of the legitimate trade away
from us.
