## National Importance of Public Health.

The fundamental importance of the subject of public health to our national civilization and industrial efficiency was concisely expressed by the Chairman of the Commission of Conservation in his inaugural address before the First Annual Meeting of the Commission. In this connection Mr. Sifton said in part: "The physical strength of the people is the resource from which all others derive value. Extreme and scrupulous regard for the lives and health of the population may be taken as the best criterion of the degree of real civilization and refinement to which a country has obtained. It cannot be said that it has received too much attention though the provinces, the Dominion, and the municipalities have health laws and health administrations all doing effective and useful work. There are, however, many branches of the subject, general in their character, which merit attention. The Dominion spends hundreds of thousands of dollars in eradicating the diseases of animals, and the work it is pleased to know, is being done with thoroughness. But no similar effort is made by province or Dominion to meet the ravages of disease among human beings, e. g. as tuberculosis."

In the past it seems to have been impossible to rouse the British manufacturer to the necessity for the establishment of Canadian branch connections. Possibly, not without reason, he looked upon Canada as a field all together too small to warrant his attention 'on the spot.' But the Canada of to-day is not the Canada of yesterday, nor will the Canada of tomorrow be the Canada of to-day. WILL IT COME?

Canada, as an investment ground for British gold, has long been favorably regarded by the astute and conservative British capitalist, who thinks more of his guaranteed low income from gilt-edged Canadian securities than he does of fortunes that may be made or lost in speculative investments in other directions. When it is considered that there is no less a sum than three hundred million pounds of British money that is invested in the Dominion, while in the purely speculative realm British money is a negligible factor, the truth of this statement will be apparent.

This peculiarity is fittingly expressed by the observation of a Canadian financier who, in conversation with a British journal, recently said: "Englishmen are the investors while Americans are the money-makers in Canada." From the Canadian viewpoint, it is unfortunate that this is the case. It would suit Canada and Canadians better if the English capitalists were not only the investors in the country, but the money-makers as well; not that the Canadians object to the investment of American capital in Canadian industries and other more or less speculative enterprises, but because if we could have our way we would rather that the whole of the good thing should be kept in the family.

## Central Baptist Association.

The Central Baptist Association has been in session at Kentville this week. There has been a good attendance of delegates and the meetings have been very interesting. The first session was held on Tuesday. After the enrollment of members, the chair named the following as a nominating committee: Pastors John Clark Price, A. W. Whitman and Messrs. Charles Masters and N. B. Smith.

A digest of letters from the forty-five churches of the association was read and accepted. This with the statistical report showed that a general spirit of revival had pervaded the churches the result being an increase in membership as reported 839. Money for local church work increased from \$3,000 to \$4,000 during the year, and for general work an addition of \$4500.

A fine new church has been erected at Canada and one minister ordained, the Rev. E. Brooks, of Rawdon. The new pastors for the year were named and received the hand of fellowship from the moderator. They were Rev. A. S. Powell, Rev. Norman Whitman, Rev. W. J. Rutledge, Rev. P. D. Nolan, Rev. C. N. Kideon, Lieutenant G. R. Lewis, Lieutenant J. A. Green, Lieutenant W. D. Wilson.

The report of the nominating committee was read and adopted, resulting in the election of Rev. Frank Best, of Canada, as the new moderator, with Rev. C. A. Freeman as assistant moderator, Rev. J. D. Spidell, secretary; Rev. E. Brooks, assistant secretary; R. H. Lamont, treasurer.

The reports from the district meetings were read by B. H. Eaton, for Halifax; Pastor Backadar, for Hants, and Rev. M. P. Freeman, for Kings, and referred to the committee on resolutions. At 4 o'clock on Tuesday Rev. P. S. McGregor, evangelist, preached from the motto, "God is not a God to be feared." His drawing lessons of practical and thorough Christian consecration from the declaration of Moses to Pharaoh in Exodus X, 26: "There shall not a hoof be left behind," and made a stirring appeal to men and women of influence to use their power to deliver their fellows from the bondage of sin.

Rev. I. W. Porter, home mission superintendent, gave in twenty minutes the quintessence of his department—the home-work foundation of all. In Nova Scotia and P. E. Island 70 pastorates have assistance. So far this year 250 converts have been added in this work. Grateful reference was made to the work of Rev. L. N. Wallace and wife, as home mission evangelists, and to the way in which Rev. Alvin Robbins, now in the field, is being honored of God in his winning. The present standing of many churches of the association is due to past home mission aid and steady work of this kind means the effectiveness of the whole world-wide service of maritime Baptists. The secretary is also a bureau of ministerial settlement at large. The negro churches were never in better condition, having five regular pastors, some of them "splendid" men. The needs are men and money and now we should make the minimum of salary at least \$700 and keep our men, who are otherwise drawn to other lands. We need in these provinces \$25,000 a year more for this work.

The Sunday-school report led to a platform demonstration in which Miss Shand, Mrs. J. R. Hensinger and Rev. G. A. Lawson, who had attended the Washington world's convention pictured the scenes of the convention and in their speeches indicated that the great gathering had made clearer to all the vision of the Christ. Miss Shand's address was particularly graphic and powerful.
