WISDOM FOR THOSE WHO SEEK IT

To dry a clean window shade spread it full length on the kitchen table or on the floor and rub it thoroughly all over with dry salt and corn meal, renewing the mixture as it becomes soiled. Then dust well with a soft duster. The shade need not be removed from the roller, and this method does not pull it out of shape or cause it to crack.

Any undesirable odors coming from glass bottles or earthen vessels can easily be remedied by filling them up with cold water in which soda has been dissolved.

Tin covers may be kept from rusting by rubbing them well when new with lard and letting them stand for twenty four hours. Do this before they have been washed, then heat them lightly by placing them in the oven; finally rub off the lard and wash.

To clean a bath mix whitening with water. Rub it over the bath; rinse out thoroughly with warm water. Dry with a clean cloth.
