**The Greeley Monument.**

The Greeley monument was unveiled at Greenwood Cemetery yesterday afternoon. The weather, though slightly cold, was such as to tempt abroad a large number of ladies, who lent their presence to the picturequeness of the crowd that assembled to witness the ceremonies. A comparison of the audience that had assembled at recent unveiling ceremonies in this vicinity, with that collected on the little knoll at Greenwood, yesterday, would suffice to disprove the adage that years are necessary to establish the status of great men, or that it is not until the generation and conditions which surrounded them have passed away that cool criticism of their character is made, and they find their proper niche in the Temple of Fame. Among those who went yesterday to do his memory honor were men who knew him at the "case" and grown up with him in greatness; men and women, with whom his written word had found sympathy, but who had never known his genial smile. Students from the only university at which Mr. Greeley was graduated, to use the words of Hayard Taylor, came. The great numbers to witness the presentation of the monument to the people.

Mr. Francis came forward, expressing thanks for the honor conferred, and at once introduced Mr. W. J. Bodwell, of Typographical Union, No. 6, who presented the monument to the people.

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
