### LOCAL AND OTHER ITEMS.

The band of the flagship Crescent played in Queen Square gardens from four to six o'clock Monday afternoon.

It is intended to hold the Scottish Gathering on the C.A.A.A. grounds, Charlottetown, on Wednesday the 16th day of August next.

The Bank of British Columbia has invited tenders in London for an issue of 2,500,000 in 3 per cent British Columbia Government stock of the minimum price of 96 per cent.

The Shamrock had a spin at Southampton on Saturday for sail stretching. The experts on board said she was the finest yacht ever seen on the Solent. Everybody was delighted with her speed.

The international cricket match at Philadelphia, on the 5th, between the Germantown club of that city and the Canadian team resulted in a victory for the former by an innings and sixty runs.

ROBERT BONSER, publisher of the New York Ledger, and owner of famous horses, died at his home in New York on Thursday night last. Mr. Bonser had been ill for six months, but had been able to be about ten days ago.

ADMIRAL CERVENA and the other commanders of the Spanish fleet destroyed in the battle of Santiago, whose conduct had been the subject of enquiry by special court martial, were acquitted and formally liberated at Madrid on Friday last.

TUS. HENDERSON, the Canadian representative of the Northern Pacific Railway at Montreal, has been advised by the president of that road that a cable has been received by him from Japan announcing that the export duty on tea from Japan will be abolished after July 17th.

Prime Minister Salisbury, who, it appears, is an ardent devotee of scientific science, has, according to the Medical Press and Circular, discovered and completed an important chemical process at his laboratory at Hatfield House, which will be communicated to the world at a forthcoming meeting of one of the learned societies.

Is a race of about 26 miles, in a strong and fairly steady breeze, at New York on Saturday the Columbia squarely out-sailed the Defender by 3 minutes and 13 seconds actual time. The Columbia in running in for her mooring after the race struck the Defender's boom, bending the hollow steel spar almost at right angles. The Columbia was uninjured.

It is stated that the Montreal Rolling Mills, one of the largest establishments of the kind on the continent, will erect a second plant in the vicinity of the Steel Works at Sydney, and that they will require at least 1,000 men to start with. The amount underwritten by the Merchant's Bank of Halifax in connection with the enterprise is reported to be \$1,300,000.

The warships Crescent, Indefatigable and Proserpine arrived in this port on Sunday afternoon. The torpedo boat destroyer, Quail arrived Saturday afternoon. The flagship, Crescent, Vice-Admiral Bedford on board, His Honor Lieutenant Governor McIntyre paid an official visit to the Crescent on Monday forenoon and was received with the usual salute. The ships left yesterday evening.

The Atlantic mail subsidies discussion is still going on between Sir Richard Cartwright and the representatives of the steamship companies. It is understood that the Minister of Trade and Commerce has distinctly informed Messrs. Torrance and Allan that if they do not put on faster ships than those now in the fleet they will only send the mails by the fastest boats and make the best arrangements he can with the New York boats for the rest.

FLOODS have of late been causing great damage in Texas. The rivers in some places rose as much as two feet in one day. The Galveston life savers brought in sixty eight refugees one night from the high embankment at the Santale Bridge over the Brazos. Four deaths by drowning are reported near there in 24 hours. Governor Sayers has received a message from Seely over the long distance telephone saying that 1,000 persons who had taken refuge on a mound three miles below there were slowly perishing for the want of food. To add to the horror the unfortunate were surrounded by poisonous reptiles.

The ninth annual meeting of the Maritime Medical Association is held in Charlottetown today and tomorrow. Several prominent physicians and surgeons from the Upper Provinces and the United States will be present among whom we might mention, Dr. Rodolphe M. J. de Montreal, lately President of the British Medical Association; Dr. Robert T. Morris, of New York; Dr. Cushing and Dr. Hoopes, of Boston; Dr. Bell and Hamilton, of Montreal. Quite a number of doctors from Nova Scotia and New Brunswick will also be present. The meeting has both its social and educational sessions.

A GRAND ball was given at Government House, by the Lieut. Governor and Mrs. McIntyre on Friday night last. This was the first "At Home" given at Government House by its present occupants, and was a most brilliant affair. The attendance was large, the decorations were most artistic and everything passed off in first class style. It was expected that the war ships would have been in port and that the Admiral and officers would have been in attendance; but, in consequence of thick weather the ships did not arrive that day as anticipated. On Monday night, therefore, an informal dance was held at Government House in honor of the Admiral and other officers.
