A settler after obtaining homestead patent, if he cannot secure a pre-emption, may take a purchased homeste ia certain districts. Price \$3.00 per acre. Must reside six months in each of three years, cultivate 50 acres and er et a house worth \$300 00.

Holders of entries may count time of employment as farm labourers in Canads during 1917, as residence duties under certain conditions,
