EXAMINATION PAPERS.

The following are the examination papers of the second Model term for 1880, Goderich. In our next we purpose inserting the examination papers of the Goderich Public Schools.

EDUCATION. 1. (a) What is education? (b) show clearly the distinction between education and instruction. 2. (a) What is meant by school discipline? How is it to be attained in school? 3. Give notes of an introductory lesson in: (a) grammar; (b) history; (c) geography. 4. Explain concisely the alphabetic, phonetic and word methods of teaching reading. Which do you prefer? 5. Write a short essay on the formation of habits in the school-room. 6. What do you understand by an object lesson? Name six suitable objects for that purpose, and give notes of a lesson on any one of them. 7. Why is it necessary that every pupil should pay strict attention in class? By what means would you sustain it? 8. Fully enumerate the objects to be attained in school organization. 9. Name the leading characteristics of a good teacher. 10. Distinguish between the rote system and the intellectual system of teaching.

SCHOOL LAW. 1. (a) What constitutes a legal agreement between a teacher and trustees? (b) By what means may it become null and void? 2. What are the requirements on the part of teacher and pupil: (a) with regard to quarterly examinations? (b) text books? 3. State fully the duties of teachers as to: (a) teaching; (b) discipline; (c) course of study to be pursued. 4. What precautions must the teacher take to prevent the spread of infectious diseases through the school? 5. Explain the law and regulations as to suspension and expulsion of pupils. 6. State the law and regulations with regard to registers and reports. 7. Supposing a teacher punished a boy by striking him about the head, or by causing him to remain seated on the bench with his feet elevated on a bench—did the teacher exceed his authority? Give reasons for your answer? 8. What are the duties of the teacher respecting all school property? 9. What days in the year are holidays and vacations in the public schools? 10. What are the regulations with regard to presents, collections, subscriptions, notices and prizes?

Oh, give relief and Heaven will bless your store." 5. State the rules both for the rising and the falling inflection. 6. In the following extract, indicate the words taking the rising inflection and those taking falling inflection:—"Good unto them that call evil good, and evil evil; that put darkness for light, and light for darkness; that put bitter for sweet, and sweet for bitter." 7. How should the following extracts be read? Why? Under-line the words affected to make your meaning clear: "Holy, holy Lord God of Sabaoth." "The cloud capped towers, the joyous palaces. The solemn temples, the great globe itself, &c." 8. What method would you adopt to cure children of the habit of dropping the voice at every pause? 9. For what are the following composition after the following suitable, "Middle" pitch, high pitch and low pitch." 10. State the general rule for giving proper variety to reading. Give explanation.

HYGIENE. 1. In what respects is it in the power of a teacher to contribute to the health, comfort and happiness of those under her care, both in the school-room and in the play ground? Answer as far as possible in a practical manner. 2. Give some directions for the management of a room in which a person is ill. 3. Explain how a healthy condition of the body is promoted by copious ablutions of cold water. 4. Describe fully the process of breathing, and explain how it is necessary to the support of life. 5. What are the special purposes accomplished by food? Trace the several changes undergone before leaving the system. 6. With brief notes on (a) Ventilation, (b) Cleanliness, (c) Cheerfulness in school-room, (d) Proper temperature of school-room, (e) The advantages and disadvantages of roasting, stewing and boiling meat, (f) How would you treat a deep cut, a person in a fainting fit. 7. Give reasons why this subject is of great importance to teachers and parents.

A can do 1/2 of a piece of work in one hour, B can do 1/3 of it in 20 minutes. In what time can A and B together do it? 3. What is the cost price of an article sold for \$3.37, when the gain is 12 %? 4. A man bought a hat, coat and vest for \$40. The hat cost \$6, the coat and vest cost 9 times as much as the vest, what was the cost of each? 5. I paid twice as much for material for a house as for labor. Had I paid 6 % more for material and 9 % more for labor, house would have cost \$1284. Find cost of the house. 6. From a pile of wood 20 ft. long, 4 ft. wide and 3 ft. high was sold \$13.50 worth at \$6 per cord. What was the remainder worth at \$5.50 per cord?

7 Sold 2 cows for the same price, losing 25 % on one and gaining 25 % on the other. Did I gain or lose, and how much %? 8 A owned 5-6 of a factory and sold 1/2 of his share to B, who sold 1/2 of his to C, who sold 1/2 of what he got to D.—What part of the whole did each then own? 9 If longitude of Hamilton be 90° west, find Hamilton time when it is 12 o'clock noon in London, England. 10 A farmer sold wheat for \$81, getting as many cents per bushel as there were bushels. How many bushels had he? 11 A man being asked how much money he had, replied if you add one to 10 times what I have, 19 times the square root of the sum will be 209. How much had he? 12 A can do a piece of work in 5-6 of a day, B in 1/2 of a day. In what time can the two together do the work? 13 3 turkeys and 5 geese cost \$5.70 and 4 turkeys and 6 geese cost \$7.20. How much more did a turkey cost than a goose? 14 A and B enter into partnership and gain \$240. A owned \$60 more than 3/4 of the stock and gains \$108. Find each one's share of the stock.

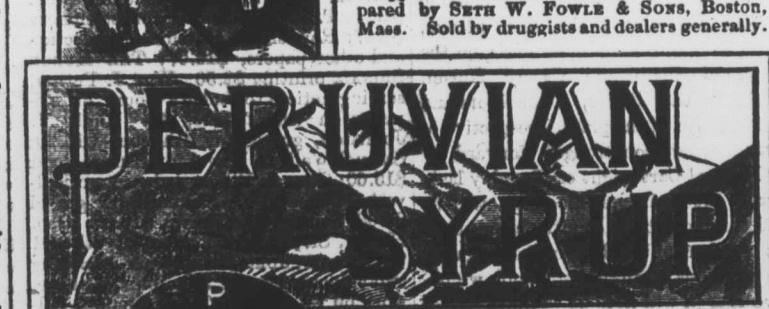
