THE SALVATION ARMY - The following
from the Seaford Examiner, concerning the doings of the salvation army, is of interest to some of our residents. We hope to see the soldiers of the army get good treatment in Goderich when they come, so that we also will be able to write well of them and their doings when they begin their work here. The Examiner says: - A detachment of the Salvation Army from Toronto arrived here on Saturday last. They were met at the station by an immense crowd of people who were evidently attracted by curiosity. The detachment consisted of five or six men and four women. They opened fire in the town hall on Sunday, holding three services, and the hall was filled with soldiers. They have been holding regular services every evening since with an undiminished attendance. On Tuesday evening the town hall being otherwise engaged they held their meeting in Carano's hall, which was crowded almost to suffocation, although it was capable of accommodating upwards of eight hundred people. The meetings thus far have been very orderly, and the members of the army seem to be very zealous workers and thoroughly in earnest. It is said they have made several converts here, and it is hoped they may be attended with success. They evidently aim at doing good, and should receive respectful treatment and encouragement.

Rev. T. M. Campbell will preach
a special sermon in the North Street Methodist church, in the interest of the Canadian Order of Foresters, on Sunday April 20th. The brethren, it is understood will attend in a body.

The apron bazar held in Davis' block
last Thursday and Friday, under the auspices of the ladies' aid society of Knox church was a success in every sense of the term. A large number of meals were furnished on both days, and all the made-up finery for ladies and children was disposed of. About \$160 were netted by the society.

HARBOR NOTES.
What is Going on Down at the Pier.

The fishing fleet is being fitted out and repaired. James Wilkinson has just completed a handsome Mississippi skiff for Geo. Grant to go a fishing in. The schooner Express, owned by Peter McEwen, is getting a new set of lower masts placed in her. Wm. Lee's schooner, Rathburn, has had a new stern and quarter put upon her. She will be in good shape for the carrying trade this year. The Jane McLeod is undergoing a complete overhauling under the supervision of Capt. Dancy, the owner, and Capt. J. W. Green, who will sail her during the coming season. Henry Marlow & Son have built three fishing boats for Messrs. John Craigie, Ira Wiggins and Wm. Saunders. Each of the boats is 30 feet keel, 9ft. 6 in. beam, with a depth of hold of 3 feet. They are of fine model, and cannot fail to prove fast sailers. John Craigie has assisted the Messrs. Marlow in the construction of them. Each boat, when rigged out, will be worth fully \$300.

OUR TOWN FATHERS.
Report of the Doings of the Last Meeting. The regular meeting of the town council was held on Friday evening last. Present - Mayor Horton in the chair, reeve Johnston, deputy reeve Cameron, and councillors Murney, Colborne, Elliott, Lee, Binham, Cantelon, Butler, Nairn, Nicholson and Jordan. The minutes of previous meeting were read and approved.

REPORTS.
The report of the cemetery sexton showed that there had been 14 interments during the month of March - 6 adults and 8 infants. The sexton also added a foot-note to the report, expressing surprise that he had been displaced and another caretaker appointed without any previous notification, and begging the council to reconsider the matter. The Finance committee recommended the payment of the accounts of Waller & Martin, \$4.50; Mrs. Mitchell, \$18.28; E. Graham, \$2.72; G. Grant, \$3.00. Respecting the application of the treasurer for an increase of salary, it was recommended that action be deferred until next meeting. - Adopted.

COMMUNICATIONS.
The cemetery committee recommended the vacant ground in section 6, range F, had been laid out in lots and numbered so that the clerk had been instructed to have notices containing the requirements of cemetery by-law posted up through the grounds. Filed.

PETITION.
From Jas. Dickson and 200 others asking that appointment of caretaker for Maitland cemetery be reconsidered. Moved by Murney, seconded by Jordan, that the appointment of Thos. Hood as caretaker be reconsidered at next meeting. Carried.

RELIEF.
St. David's ward, February, \$34.50; St. David's, March, \$33.50; St. Andrew's, March, \$24.25; St. Patrick's, March, \$32. Moved by Butler, seconded by Nicholson, that four lamps be had for west street, and summer house in park be repaired. Referred to public works committee with power to act. The reeve asked respecting improvements contemplated on the square - also as to the repairing of Atrill's steps. Referred to public works committee. Reeve Johnston stated that on a recent trip to Ottawa he had called on Mr. Parley, who had informed him that the dredge could not come early. About the life saving station, the Government was building boats to place at several points and Goderich would likely receive one. A number of accounts were referred to finance committee. Council then adjourned.
