At The City Hall.

The regular weekly session of the Council Board was held yesterday afternoon. The full board including the Mayor, were present.

While the bills were being passed Councillor Mullaly objected to the unfair distribution of work, particularly amongst Blacksmiths.

The Mayor said that orders were issued for Council work to be evenly divided and if such was not the case the Secretary would be held responsible. The Secretary stated that there are instances where it is impossible to wait over for articles that are needed immediately. Following this some petty reports were exchanged between the Mayor and Councillor Mullaly.

Sir E. P. Morris wrote re proposed loan of \$20,000.00 as desired by the Council. The matter is now under the consideration of the Government.

Secretary of Gas Company wrote asking if Monday noon would be suitable to meet the Council for a conference re lights, etc. Agreed to.

M. & E. Kennedy wrote regarding the inclosure near Joseph's buildings on Water Street. They will lay plank on Water Street for benefit of pedestrians.

Harvey & Co. asked permission to have sewer extended in Factory Lane. It is now too late in the season to have the work done.

Peters & Sons asked that some grading be done near the C. E. I. Rooms. Will be attended to.

T. Hallett wrote re conditions in

Walsh's Square. Referred to Engineer.

Mrs. W. G. Williams was given contract to supply bulbs in Bannerman Park.

Residents of Gear Street petitioned for a surface drain. The Engineer will report on the matter.

Tenders for plumbing were received. On motion of Councillor Ryan, seconded by Councillors Myrick and Cosker, Wills' tender was accepted.

Permission was granted to McCarthy Bros. to repair home on Water St. W. Taylor asked to lay water pipes in Casey Street. Referred to Engineer.

ENGINEER'S GOOD SUGGESTION.

Engineer Ryan in submitting his weekly report pointed out that Winsor Lake was higher now than for many years past due to the almost continuous rain falls. He showed that a serious condition of affairs existed in 1906, when Winsor Lake sank 3 feet, 6 inches below the normal. He then suggested that Round Pond at the head of the lake, the waters of which now run waste to Torbay be dammed and turned towards Winsor Lake to be held in reserve for emergencies of a similar kind to that of 1906. It would cost much but the innovation would be of incalculable benefit to the city.

The Mayor fully approved of Mr. Ryan's suggestion and held that with the improved service waste had increased. If conditions existed again as they did in 1906 the matter of a water supply for the city would be a

serious problem. His idea was to ask the Government to give no more grants around the margin of Round Pond, and for the city to procure money to buy out the holdings of those now there.

Councillor Myrick was in accord with the Mayor and Engineer and believed that Mundy's Pond and George's Pond should also be dammed, and connected with the mains as a reserve water supply in the event of shortage during a conflagration.

Councillor Mullaly also agreed with the Mayor and held that the city owed a debt of gratitude to Engineer Ryan for evolving a scheme which would be a perpetual protection to the city and one which had caused other Councils much concern and no little worry and which he believed now definitely solved the problem of a prolific water supply. It was decided to act on the plans advanced by the Engineer if funds could be obtained and the Government will be written for aid in the matter.

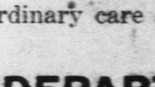
