ing; England and Scotland are in the

act of placing a crown upon her head.

Erin's dress in the first tableau was

of white silk decorated with sham

rocks; in the second tableau she wore

the same dress with cloak of green;

the dress was trained and its beauty

enhanced by flashing gems to signify

that after Home Rule Erin's ancient

grandeur and wealth shall return to

her. Scotland was dressed in the

color of her own blue bells wreathed

in folds of filmy lace. Miss Norah

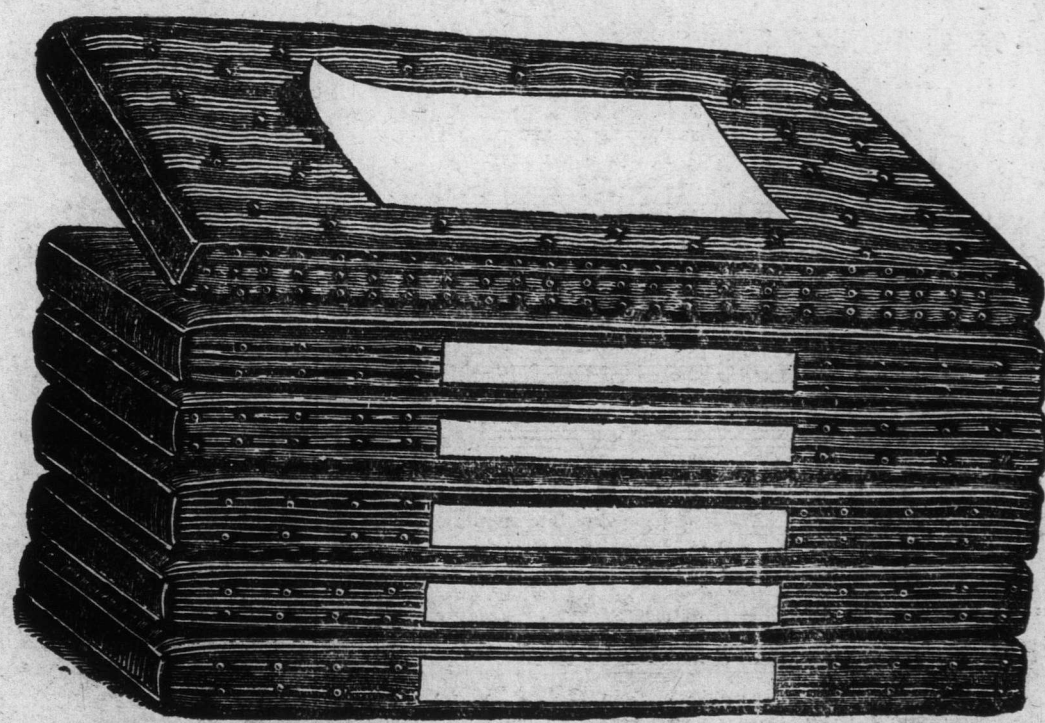
