"We started the first thing in the morning," he says, "when we had a brush with two destroyers. It was misty and they were practically invisible, but I believe they were hit twice before disappearing in the mist. After that we turned and steamed out of it, but were recalled by an urgent wireless message from one of our ships which was in difficulties. Of course, the ship was imnediately turned, and we proceeded at full speed to the scene of opera-
