The War Week by Week.

The past seven days have been eventful ones, justifying the predictions of those who foretold great military activity with the approach of summer. The news has on the whole been distinctly cheering, the capture of Vaux by the Germans being perhaps the only dark spot in it. Enough has now been definitely learned of the result of the great naval engagement to establish it as a British victory. The flight alone of the German fleet would constitute it such, but that their losses should actually have been greater than ours, and in the class of ship wherein they could least be afforded, is a piece of good news far other than the first reports led us to expect. The world is waiting greedily for Admiral Jellicoe's report.

How closely all parts of the struggle are correlated is shown by one effect attributed by experts to this battle—the paralysis of German naval operations against Russia in the Baltic. In the case of a German military offensive against Russia, the left wing of their army would have invaluable assistance from their navy, and if not the greatest menace, would form an excellent pivot on which to swing forward, farther south, against Vilna. All danger, it is said, of any advance through Courland against Riga is now removed by the weakening of the German navy and the increasing strength of British submarines in those waters.

However that may be, Germany is now compelled to look to herself in another place, Russia having taken the initiative in no uncertain manner. The weight of her blow, however, is aimed chiefly at Austria, as might have been expected. Russia seems bent on surprising the world. The rapidity and strength of the assault which reduced Ezerum and then Trebizond are here repeated in Galicia. Allowing for exaggerations in the reports, the Russian progress against strong defences, supported by topographical difficulties, is surprising, and if the figures are to be trusted, more than one hundred thousand prisoners is not a bad bag for a few days' fighting. It is now announced from Petrograd that the Stry has been crossed, which means another formidable obstacle overcome. This river rises near, and runs north-east of, Lemberg, which seems to be definitely threatened.

If the Russian successes are carried to any great length, they are certain to have not only a military but a political effect. Whether or not Roumania will be influenced will soon be seen, but it should help to clarify the situation in Greece, where matters are becoming intolerable. We are ready to expect anything from Greece, even a Graco-Bulgarian alliance. Might may not be right, but it seems to be the only argument in the Balkans. Strong pressure by the Allies will, no doubt, hasten a cabinet crisis, the overthrow of Skouloudis and the return of Venizelos. This would at least give the Allies a free hand at Salonika, where they have not been massing troops for nothing.

Sad Drowning Fatality.

A tragedy occurred at Gull Pond, off the Thorburn Road yesterday afternoon when Francis Edwards lost his life by drowning. Deceased was a native of England and 26 years of age. He had been a draper in the employ of the Royal Stores, Ltd., since February last and for several years previous worked in the dry goods department at Mr. G. Knowling's. Yesterday morning, in company with two other young men named Duncan McLean and William King, he left town to spend the day in the country. When they reached Gull Pond they launched a flat bottom boat that was there and rowed off to the middle of the pond and started fishing. The forenoon was spent by the party in enjoyment and pleasure and nothing happened out of the ordinary. Early in the afternoon, however, Edwards, who was sitting in the forepart of the boat, overbalanced himself and fell overboard. He could not keep afloat as he was unable to swim, besides being heavily clad, and sank immediately. One of his comrades McLean made several efforts to save him, but without avail. First McLean plunged in the water and seized Edwards and brought him to the surface, but as he did so Edwards grasped him around the neck and to save himself McLean was compelled to make Edwards release his hold. A trouting rod was reached the drowning man, but as he grasped it the joints came apart and in an instant Edwards sank to rise no more. Where the drowning occurred the water is less than ten feet deep, consequently there was not much difficulty experienced in recovering the body, which was taken to the morgue a few hours later in charge of Supt. Grimes and Sergt. Savage. A post mortem was held on it last night and this morning the body was coffined and prepared for burial.

Capt. Wes March Home on Furlough.

Capt. Wesley March, of the 1st Nfld. Regiment who saw active service with D Company at the Gallipoli Peninsula, and who now comes direct from the trenches in France, arrived in the city last evening by the s.s. Sable I, which ship he joined at North Sydney after visiting London, Liverpool and Quebec, en route to St. John's.

He speaks in glowing terms of the splendid manner in which "Ours" behaved in that never-to-be-forgotten Gallipoli campaign in which many of our brave boys paid the supreme sacrifice. Although Capt. March declines to speak of his own part of the work, we have evidence enough to prove how invaluable it was. For Capt. Bernard, he has nothing but the highest praise, who under trying conditions held a section of the trenches at a time when he was almost half dead with dysentery, and when taken from the trenches had to be placed on a stretcher. Not for one moment did he allow his men to lose heart, but gave them all the encouragement possible to keep their spirits up. The Military Cross which he recently received, is the reward of his faithful duty. Private Gladney, who was decorated with the D.C.M., was awarded that honor for services performed as a scout, in which capacity he gained valuable information concerning the movements of the Turks. Capt. March spoke in very touching words of the heroic conduct and death of Private Jno. Fitzgerald. Deeds of personal bravery time and again were performed which may never be known to the Empire at large. The much delayed Mayo-linds, shirts and socks had reached the boys at their quarters in France, and with the incomparable home-made articles the Newfoundland soldiers were to be invited by the soldiers of other regiments.

Capt. March was given leave on May 22nd and while in London saw many of our boys and officers. Included in the latter number were Capt. Carthy, who is returning home on sick leave, Capt. O'Brien, who has been appointed in command of A Co., now in France, and Lt. Herbert Rendell, who, has also resumed duty. Capt. March, after completing arrangements in connection with the estate of his late father, whose death occurred recently, will return to active service.
