MAN POWER PROBLEM.

LONDON, Jan. 14. Sir Auckland Geddes, Minister of the National Service, prefaced his remarks on the Government's man power proposals by the declaration that nothing could be more misleading than the suggestion that the man power problem could be solved by a dramatic stroke. It was the central problem of the war. It means every-thing, he said, ships, armies, munitions, food, light, heat and coal. At the moment the most anxious problem is the supply of men for the army, but we have to take steps against that when it will be a time which I believe isn't far distant. Going into the details of the situation, the Minister said in part, the plain facts don't support the statement that the armies are melting for the lack of recruits and that recruiting has broken down. The Government has examined in detail the position of the armies on the east front and the results are not unsatisfactory. Exclud- ing Russia and Romania, the Allies have substantial superiority in fighting and ration strength over the Cen- tral Powers. From a statistical stand- point the strength of the enemy gives some cause for anxiety. The withdrawal of Russia means that not less than 600,000 men will be available to Ger- many on the west front. Notwith- standing Russia's defection, however, the resources of the Allies and Amer- ica are sufficient.

FOOD FOR THE ALLIES.

BUENOS AIRES, Jan. 14. The Foreign Minister to-day signed an agreement with the British and French ministers to sell 2,500,000 tons of wheat to the Entente Allies. An- other cause for anxiety, the Minister said, is to open a credit at the bank of the National Bank of Amer- ica, which is to be liquidated in two installments, which is to be virtual- ly a huge loan to the Allies to stabil- ize the rate of exchange.

SUCCESSFUL RAID.

LONDON, Jan. 14. A successful daylight raid has been made on Karlsruhe, according to a British official statement issued last night.

UNSETTLED GERMANY.

LONDON, Jan. 14. Reading between the lines in the German papers it becomes apparent that the conferences of military and political leaders now taking place at Berlin are regarded as an effort to obtain some sort of agreement with the Allies, which is to be virtual- ly a huge loan to the Allies to stabil- ize the rate of exchange.

ONLY MINOR DEVELOPMENTS.

WASHINGTON, Jan. 14. Only minor developments at the battlefronts are recorded in the weekly review of the military operations made public to-night by the war de- partment. Wintry weather is inter- fering with operations in Italy, France and Flanders, and in Russia the military situation is overshadowed by the peace negotiations from which the Review says, no conclu- sions can be safely drawn. Of the American forces in France the depart- ment announced that their prepara- tion for the ordeal of the battle is being steadily pursued and that Gen- eral Pershing reports their health and fighting spirits extremely good.

BULGARIAN ANXIOUS FOR PEACE.

AMSTERDAM, Jan. 14. Press despatches from Sofia say that Bulgarian papers of all political militions welcome President Wil- son's address to Congress as a step towards peace. Minister Andranod of Sofia, finds a resemblance between the President's terms and those of the Bolsheviks. The Democratic or- gan, Proletariat, appeals to Wilson to settle the Balkan question on the basis of nationalities and historic ten- dencies, and give Serbia an outlet to the Adriatic.

SHIP SINKING.

AN ATLANTIC PORT, Jan. 13. Agents of the American steamship line, 1,400 tons, to-day received ad- vice from the naval authorities that the ship was sinking at sea. The location of the ship was not given.

BRITISH OFFICIAL.

LONDON, Jan. 14. The report from Marshal Haig's

headquarters in France to-night says: Early this morning the enemy raided one of our posts southeast of Armentieres. A few of our men are missing. Hostile artillery has been active in St. Julien area and south of Sargli- court.

FRENCH OFFICIAL.

PARIS, Jan. 13. On the left bank of the Meuse (Ver- dun front) the French fire directed with precision dispersed German de- tachments which were attempting to approach our lines in the sector of Goose Hill.

ITALIAN OFFICIAL.

ROME, Jan. 14. (Official.) Along the whole front there were scattered and not very intense ar- tillery actions, and some activity by reconnoitering parties east of Cape Sile and north of Cortellazzo, our pa- troles drove back small enemy posts, destroying defences and capturing material.

HUN METHODS.

HAVRE, Jan. 13. The Burgomaster, Alderman and Councillor of Mons have been con- demned individually to pay a heavy fine for refusing to have the bells rung to celebrate the German an- nouncement of victory at Caporetto, on the Isonzo front.

RUSSIAN DEMANDS.

LONDON, Jan. 14. Immediate rehabilitation of de- ported peoples and liberation of all Bo- hemian Czechs and others arrested by the Central Powers for their con- nection with the pacifist propaganda, were among the demands made by the Russian delegates at Brpet-Litovsk conference on Friday, according to the Petrograd correspondent of the Exchange Telegraph Co. The return of the refugees to Poland and Lit- uania is of the utmost importance in the quest of self-determination. To this the German delegates replied: "These demands involve questions of inter- national policy which can't possibly be discussed in peace parties. Foreign Min- ister Trotsky declared that the Rus- sians will not abandon their demands. Petrograd despatches received here to-day report that interest in the Russian capital now has been diverted from the Brest-Litovsk peace negotia- tions to preparations for the meeting on Friday of the Constituent Assem- bly. The Bolshevik authorities, an- ticipating trouble, have brought four warships through the ice from Kron- stadt to maintain order, as the Bol- sheviki believe Premier Lenin's plan, entirely, and displace it with the Work- men's and Soldiers' Congress which meets January 21st. To-day is the Russian New Year and the next two days will be observed as holidays. No papers will be published.

MEXICAN PLOTTERS EXECUTED.

MEXICO CITY, Jan. 14. Ten army officers, including General Leo Cadillo Barra, out of 46 arrested in connection with the plot to kill General Alfredo Hove, commander of the military district, in the State of Mexico, and Augustin Millan, Gov- ernor of the State, were executed to- day at Toluca, the State capital about forty miles from this city. The plot was discovered last Thursday and in- volved the looting of Toluca.

STANDARDIZING SHIPS.

LONDON, Jan. 14. The announcement was made in the Commons to-day that thirteen stan- dardized merchant ships had been completed up to the end of last year, one of which was sunk. Sir Leo G. Chiozza Money, Parliamentary Pri- vate Secretary to the Minister of Munitions, replying to a question, whether the proportion of ships completed to those sunk in November was maintained in December informed the House that the result wasn't so good in December. The keel of the first British Government's standardized merchant ships was laid down in February, 1917, and the hull was launched in June.

GERMAN CHANCELLOR ILL.

LONDON, Jan. 14. According to telegrams from Ber- lin to-day, Count Von Hertling, the German Imperial Chancellor, is ill and will probably resign shortly, says an Exchange Telegraph Co.'s despatch from Amsterdam.

WORK OF A SPY.

SEATTLE, Jan. 14. Federal agents asserted to-day that a German spy masquerading as a helmsman under the name of Wm. Swanson, stood at the wheel of the Alaskan liner Spokane when she crashed into the rocks off Idol Point, B.C. on the night of Nov. 23rd, 1917, while bound from South Eastern Alas- ka for Seattle with 237 passengers. Swanson has disappeared, the agents said, with Carl E. Elias, a German, and Carl White, Austrian member of the crew. He was arrested Nov. 28, on his arrival here, but the three were released Dec. 1st.

SHIPS FIRST.

WASHINGTON, Jan. 14. Ships carrying food and munitions for American overseas forces and the Allies must be supplied with better fuel coal even at the expense of domestic consumption and factories manufac- turing war supplies. This ruling was announced to-day by Fuel Adminis- trator Gardell.

ADDRESSES CANADIAN CLUB.

MONTREAL, Jan. 14. Great things are coming out of this war, said Rev. Dr. W. J. Dawson, of Newark, N.J., in addressing the Cana- dian Club here to-day, and I think the greatest thing of all is the real con- federation and union of the Anglo- Saxon people of the earth. Doctor Dawson said it was worth all the bloodshed if the war produced no other results than the bringing to- gether of the peoples of this great American continent in unity of common pur- pose, for common freedom and com- mon righteousness of politics and Government.

There is not much hope of my getting home for Xmas, but please God I will get home some day. Have you heard that Wil- fred Dave is a prisoner of war. When you write tell me if they hear from him. So I must now close. Please let Miss Grace Gardner, Brit- ish Harbour, Trinity Bay, know that her brother is well and that I and him are doing well at present. So good-bye from GEORGE.
