England on Verge of Collapse.

Conditions in England are going from bad to worse and any sanity which the nation possessed before the war seems to have disappeared. A wave of degeneracy is sweeping over the country and all classes seem to be affected. No longer, apparently, is the phlegmatic nature of the British people able to cope with their new social disease which is making rich and poor alike. Men and women are flinging their honor and virtue to the winds and crime is rampant throughout the nation. A similar condition preceded the fall of the Roman Empire and a similar fate seems in store for England, unless the people can return to the ways of decency and clean living.

Lloyd George's gloomy speech, recently, gives an insight into the terror which is now in the hearts of thoughtful Englishmen, they see in the future nothing to reassure them, though millions of square miles have been added to the British Empire and indemnities equal to a kingdom's ransom have been pledged by Germany. The cancer of social unrest has grown into a malignant disorder, which threatens the very existence of England and the complete break-up of her far-flung empire.

The laboring classes of England have now the upper hand, but elements among them are so hindering the work of reconstruction by their excesses that chaos is the result. The nobility and the moneyed class have lost their poise and are indulging in orgies of waste and extravagance, which bodes ill for the future.

And yet, in spite of the alarming situation at home, Great Britain is engaged in several wars in various parts of the world, spending the funds which she now needs so badly in destroying the nationality of other peoples. It is safe to say that England is now regarding the harvest of her sins against humanity and the present crisis which faces her is an indication of the punishment which Providence in its own sweet time metes out to nations as well as individuals which disregard the laws of God and man in their dealings with the world at large.—Charleston American.

The "Philadelphia Lawyer's" Origin.

The phrase "Philadelphia lawyer" is supposed to pay tribute to the singular pertinacious astuteness of attorneys who hail from the Quaker City. But the origin of the phrase is known to few.

John Peter Zenger was a German-born publisher in New York, who started in business in that city about 1700. His Weekly Journal which he began to put out in 1733 attacked the colonial Governor and was opposed by the authorities. It was decreed in council that certain of Zenger's offending publications should be burned by the common hangman, and that he should be put in prison on a charge of libel.

The issue of the freedom of the press was at stake. Zenger's friends scoured the colonies for the ablest advocate obtainable. They finally chose Andrew Hamilton of Philadelphia, who with his son built Independence Hall. Hamilton was speaker of the Assembly of Pennsylvania in 1729, and held many other public offices. He rode over from Philadelphia on horseback, delivered speeches of fiery eloquence and close reasoning that held the jury spellbound, and overwhelmingly carried the day for the poor printer. The populace, who surrounded the building where the trial took place, were all for Hamilton from the start, and the verdict of the jury reflected the public sentiment. Hamilton was cheered to the echo, and sumptuously banqueted; and when he departed he stepped in the North River fired a salute.

The prestige Hamilton thus acquired for the Philadelphia bar has attached to it ever since.

The Artful Dodger.

Lloyd George is one of those men who have greatness thrust upon them. He has always just failed to complete his most generous promises. He promises to power on the strength of his promises to the Irish and Labour Parties, and when in the height of his power, he gracefully denied his former friends. His shuffling methods have, however, been quite successful up to the present, and he comes back from Paris with added prestige as a successful political schemer. The Sydney, Australia Sun says of little Lloyd: "He has never been a courageous man in great decisions." He has a habit of backing at the last hurdle. If compromises can be reduced, or if the cost of giving in is not too great, he will abandon his policy." But Lloyd George cannot go on forever dodging fate on great issues. Necessity is close upon his trail!
