TWO WRONGS MAKE A RIGHT?

Is what is wrong doing for one side of politics right for the other? Why will people exclaim loudly against the action of the other side, and when their own side gets in power and does the same thing they excuse it by saying that the other fellow did it, anyhow.

It strikes us that altogether too frequent among us is that habit which we have of excusing our own wrong doings by pointing out those of the other fellow.

When after the 1913 election, and the defeat of the Morris ministers Blandford, of Agriculture, and Squires, of Justice, in Bonaville and Trinity districts, both were permitted to keep their portfolios by being given seats in the Upper House the then opposition exclaiming most loudly, "True, Premier Morris was able to prove that it was not contrary to the letter of the Constitution; but it was entirely contrary to the spirit of the Constitution, and was simply done in order that the Morris Government might hold its majority, as it feared to open any district."

Unfortunately, what was wrong in the other side becomes excusable in ones own. A similar state of things exists to-day. Dr. Campbell, the Minister of Agriculture and Mines, is a defeated candidate for St. John's West, just as Blandford and Squires were in 1913. He holds his portfolio by virtue of a seat in the Upper House just as they did. If the former case was contrary to the spirit of the Constitution, what is the latter?

Personally our opinion is that Premier Squires was anxious to get Dr. Campbell duly elected.

The Woodford affidavit has been denied and is, we presume, now the subject, or soon to be the subject, of an enquiry by Commission.

Here are some facts. Dr. Campbell is a Roman Catholic. The District of Mr. Main is a Roman Catholic district. If Mr. Woodford could be induced to resign his seat here was an excellent opening to run a by-election with the Minister of Agriculture and Mines.

ture and Mines as the Government nominee, and who can doubt but that Mr. Main would have returned a man on the Government side?

This is a link, and a strong one, in the chain of evidence, circumstantial and otherwise, that hangs around the Woodford affidavit.

SIXTEEN DAYS DOING NOTHING.

The debate on the Speech from the Throne ended on Friday; that means that a fortnight of the people's time has been wasted by its politicians.

The Speech from the Throne is nothing more than an expression of opinion of the Government of the day, and a foreshadowing of the legislation which it proposes to bring in. To pass an opinion on it may be worth while, and two days should be quite ample in which to discuss its merits, but to spend over a fortnight, in what is absolutely useless talk arguing, is a waste of the people's time that is little short of criminal in these times of stress and difficulty.

Probably the opposition are chiefly to blame because theirs have been regular "hold up" tactics as instance the record speech of Sir M. P. Cashin. But the Government members have shared in the waste of time, debating something that did not matter, anyhow.

We sometimes sputter a bit because at our own local public meetings we waste a good deal of time in useless talking; but there at any rate, we give our time free.

The legislators of the country—we care not on what side of politics—are the servants of the people, duly elected to do their best for the people. To spend sixteen days in debating the opening speech, without a single effort at law making, is to our mind unfair to the people who elected them.

Similarly the old, old story of presenting petitions in the House, is still being continued. If the people don't know it is time for them to realize that the presenting of petitions for various public works in the Assembly is nothing but a farcical waste of time. If the grant is to be forthcoming from the Department it will come.

Politicians know this perfectly, but they love to put one over on their constituency by a long winded piece of oratory on the grant of a road from Nicks Nose Bight to Billy Goat Cove.

May 20. The Committee on the Fisheries Regulations held a session during the evening, and the House did not open until 5.30.

The Bill entitled "An Act to amend Chapter 11 of the Consolidated Statutes of Newfoundland (Third Series) entitled 'Of the Department of Marine and Fisheries,'" passed the third reading.

Bills entitled "An Act to amend Chapter 172 of the Consolidated Statutes of Newfoundland (Third Series) entitled 'Of the Survey of Foreign-going and Labrador Vessels,'" and "An Act to amend the Judicature Act" reached the Committee stage.

A Bill entitled "An Act to Confirm a Contract between the Government and the St. Lawrence Timber, Pulp and Steamship Co., Ltd., was read a second time.

The Hon. Leader of the Government tabled the replies to Hon. J. Browning's question re payments made to the Medical Board by the Department of Militia.

A Bill entitled "An Act respecting the Harbor of Grand Bank" was read a first time.

The House adjourned till Tuesday next at 4.30 p.m.

Episcopal Visit.

Of His Lordship Bishop White to Foxtrap.

Ascension Day, 1920, will long be marked as a very happy and joyous one to the church people of Kalligrews, Foxtrap and Long Pond. It was the day on which our beloved Bishop paid his first visit to this mission for the purpose of holding a Confirmation Service. The profusion of bunting displayed from every point of vantage, and magnificent arches erected en route to the church, testified to the loyalty and affection of the people for their spiritual head. One thing noticeable was that the "artillery" of these places was silent on this memorable occasion. But when one considers how everything has gone sky-rocketing in regard to prices, no doubt gunpowder comes under the list as well.

I am sure the good Bishop will overlook and forgive us for not being quite so demonstrative in our welcome as those of other missions. Altogether 94 candidates received the sacred rite, witnessed by a large congregation.

The church here no longer justifies its existence as a building. A church with treble the seating capacity of the present one, must be aimed at to meet the requirements of an ever-increasing population. Already a good start has been made in collecting funds, and we hope eventually to see two things accomplished: (a) an up-to-date, commodious church erected within the next three or four years; (b) the mission divided with headquarters at Foxtrap. The present Incumbent, Rev. Hugh Facey, B.A., is very keen on this matter, and it is up to the people to back him. Further comment is unnecessary.
