## Viceroy Ordered Release of Footballers.

**Kidnapped Loyalists Will be Liberated -- Labor Candidate Beat Government Nominee -- Conclave Period Will be Extended to 15 Days.**

BELFAST, Feb. 19.—The members of the football team of the Irish Republican Army, recently captured at Drogheda, have been released by the Viceroy, according to an official announcement today. The announcement adds that the Viceroy has given assurance of the release of additional kidnapped loyalists.

**DEFEAT FOR GOVERNMENT.**  
LONDON, Feb. 19.—The Coalition Government sustained a severe reverse in the by-election in the Clayton Division of Manchester, when the Labor candidate, J. Sutton, polling 1,032 votes against the Unionist candidate, Flanagan, who polled 1,038. The Labor campaign was fought largely on the unemployment question, and the Government was traditionally regarded as the cause of the tendency of the country.

**REBEL OUTBREAK IN MEXICO.**  
MEXICO CITY, Feb. 19.—A week of sporadic revolts in northern Mexico has left the Federal Government forces entirely in control of the situation and with none of the factions offering a serious menace according to the War Office here.

**DESIRE TO BE PRESENT.**  
ROME, Feb. 19.—The Cardinals of the American Continent have formally asked Pope Pius XI to attend the constitution of the Conclave for the election of a Pope, which is being held in the Vatican during the death of a Pope. The Cardinals of the American Continent are desiring to be present at the Conclave in order to allow them to attend the election of a Pope in the future. The Pope has refused the request favorably and according to reports in Vatican quarters will extend the period from ten to twelve days, deeming it unwise to have the church longer without a Pope.

**AGAINST WOMAN SUFFRAGE.**  
MONTREAL, Feb. 19.—An episcopal letter congratulating the women of Quebec who are opposing the Women's Suffrage Movement in this Province, has been issued by the Rev. P. E. Roy, coadjutor of his eminence Cardinal Beaudry. Mr. Roy says the Women's Suffrage is contrary to the traditional traditions and faith in the French-Canadian race. ## Produce and Provisions.

(From Saturday's Trade Review.)

**Codfish.**—The export of codfish this week amounted to 41,427 quintals all from St. John's as follows:—

By S.S. Digby 7,503 quintals from various shippers to Liverpool, by the S.S. "Older" 24,048 quintals from various exporters to Malaga for orders; by S.S. "Canadian Sapper" 400 quintals to Halifax; by schooner "Rosalia Bellavien" from A. E. Hickman Co., 1,564 qts. to Kingston, Jamaica, and 1,564 qts. to Moulton, 5,429 qts. The consumption in the European markets is increasing and the prospects of profitable marketing are looking brighter for sales the coming spring.

**Cod Oil.**—There is a little stir in the Cod Oil business in Great Britain this month, as well as in New England States, and there are grounds for believing that the long dull spell will be broken soon in the expected general revival of the industries in which this product is used. The exports this week amounted to 12,974 gallons from Messrs. Job Bros. and Bowring Bros. to Liverpool by the S.S. Digby, the first to go forward to the European side for a long time, and 28,773 gallons by the S.S. Rosalind to New York from Job and Ebsary. The opening price for next season's Newfoundland oil depends on the size of the Norwegian catch of Cod just now beginning.

**Cod Liver Oil.**—A small shipment of 625 gallons of Cod Liver Oil was made this week to Liverpool in the S.S. Digby from Job Bros. The market on both sides of the Atlantic is still dull and no enquiries are being made. The slight advance of \$1.50 to \$2.00 per barrel that was made in the United States market at the beginning of the year is being well maintained, and induces a hope amongst exporters that prices may be better next summer for the new 1922 Cod Liver Oil, and afford a sufficient inducement for Newfoundlanders to carry on. As in the case of Cod Oil, much depends on the Norwegian Fishery now commencing.

**Lobsters.**—The outlook for the Lobster Fishery the coming season is getting brighter every month. The quotation for No. 1 Pack, 48 1-lb. tins to a case, advanced five shillings etc., in the London market last week, and the price is now on a basis of \$23.50 in Newfoundland. Enquiries have been made from London to exporters here the past few weeks but the answer has been, that there are none to ship. A New York dealer also called this week but the answer was that this week as for "all that could be secured." The prospect for the coming season is enhanced by the fact that tin is 50 per cent lower in price than last year. The opening price is expected to be \$25. per case for new pack, but much depends on the Nova Scotia catch. The United Can Manufacturers Co., of this City, have "cleared the decks" for the largest output of cans in the history of the factory. They have improved machinery now, which is capable of sealing 72 cans in two minutes.

**Flour.**—The flour situation continues strong and following the wheat advances of the past month, flour is now about one dollar per barrel higher in price in the local market than it was the first week of January, when the low point was reached. The reports of the winter wheat crop in the United States are alarming, and a big shortage is now certain owing to the unfavorable weather. The local quotation for leading brand this week is \$9.75 to \$10.00 wholesale. The imports for this week were 3,805 barrels and 560 sacks; by the S.S. Sable I, and Digby, and 2,322 barrels by the S.S. Mapledawn; total 6,027 barrels and 560 sacks.

**Molasses.**—The supply of molasses is now running low in the St. John's market, and the situation is aggravated by the fact that the "Carina" on the way here from Barbados with about 600 puncheons has been dismantled and driven away south in the recent storm, and may not arrive here till April. This cargo was counted on to relieve the scarcity in the market and keep the trade going till the first new cargo should arrive, probably early in April. The quotation here is still 80 cents per gallon. The price of new Barbados is a long way above the parity of sugar, and it is believed will

**Sugar.**—By the S.S. Digby this week 1,800 barrels, and by the S.S. Mapledawn 470 bags came in. The market is once more getting settled and a quiet spell is anticipated by the trade since business has been put on a steady basis in Cuba and control has been abandoned. There is quite a difference of opinion, however, as to future prices, some of the experts maintaining that before the spring is far advanced sugar will be much higher, while others express the belief that quotations will continue steady, at about their present levels for the next five or six months at least. Mr. Hoover is amongst those who predict higher prices before May. The St. John's wholesale price to-day is \$10.25 per 100 lbs. in the barrel.

**Potatoes.**—Holders of imported stock are now taking the market as the frosty weather prevents home-grown potatoes from coming forward. The price of the former in wholesale lots is \$3.50 per sack of 100 lbs., and \$3.90 by the single sack. Local potatoes sold last week at \$3.50 to \$3.70 per barrel. There are large quantities of these to come forward when the weather gets mild, and it is not expected that the price will be any higher. By the S.S. Rosalind 300 barrels came in to F. McNamara's from Halifax.

**Hay.**—Five car loads of Hay were imported by the S.S. Rosalind from Halifax this week, and 1,001 bales by the S.S. Mapledawn from St. John, N. B., which gave a good supply to the market. The local price per ton is now \$52.50 to \$53.00, according to quantity of purchase. This is an advance of about \$2.00 a ton since New
