Dear Sir .- I wish to congratulate you on your splendid Editorial this ening, it is timely and to the point We have reached a crisis in civic affairs and as you rightly point out, are without strong leadership. The city has not made the progress expected had at the Council Board men and who lack the courage to modernize the city.

The present Council is now finish ing its term and leaves behind it a record for conservatism which is alogether unsuited to the present age. For four years the citizens have demanded among other things.

1. The extension of water and sewerage facilities in congested districts hair as well as on the borders of the town and lower the death rate which is Items From to improve the health of the people nearly double that of London.

2. The gradual abolition of slum dom, the building of tenements by the council and by building societies at a reasonable rental.

3. Sidewalks without holes, rocks, mud, etc., with concrete curbs and gutters to give the people a chance to keep from under the wheels of motor cars.
