is visiting relatives in the city for a few
days.

—The city hospital, jail and other such
institutions are deluged with visitors dur-
ing the Fair.

—The M. C. R.'s quota for the Fair yes-
terday morning was seven heavily laden
cars of passengers.

—Mr. P. Le Sur, from Jersey Channel
Islands, is visiting his cousin, Mrs. J. W.
Wootton, Maitland street.

—Three horses found in Mr. W. H. Bar-
tram garden, London West, Tuesday night
were impounded by Constable Ward.

—The following former Londoners, now
living in Detroit, were in the Fair yes-
terday: Mrs. Thos. Luscumb, Mr. Bert
Mooney, and Mr. Isla McConnell.

—Miss Fowler, of Watford, took in the
Chicago Exposition. Although fresh from the
Chicago Exposition, Miss Fowler speaks
well of London's great and only show.

—Mr. O. C. Elliot, secretary of the
Woodstock Y. M. C. A., has resigned his
position, having received and accepted a
call to the Tavistock Baptist Church.

—Residents of London West complain
that the London Street Railway Company
are unnecessarily blockading Dundas street
where the electric railway is being put
down.

—Mr. D. McNicholl, general passenger
agent of the C. P. R., on his last visit to
this city said that there would likely be no
further reduction in the rates to the
World's Fair.

—It has been reported that a new time-
table will come into effect on the L. and
S. R. on Monday next. Mr. John Paul, of
the M. C. R., has as yet received no notice
of any change.

—Mr. S. M. Vail, of Coldstream, brought
into the ADVERTISER office yesterday a
number of fine Bartlett pears which had
grown on a branch grafted on a mountain
ash tree. The fruit was of a delicious
flavor.

—Contracts have been let for the erec-
tion on Queen's avenue of a \$10,000 resi-
dence for Mr. C. W. Leonard. The walls
will be of red brick. Mr. Ed. Martyn has
the contract for the brickwork, and Mr.
Wm. Geary for the carpentering.

—All the trains coming into the city
yesterday brought big crowds to the
fair. The C. P. R., G. T. R., London,
Huron and Bruce and the M. C. R. all had
heavy trains; on the last mentioned the ten
coaches and baggage cars were jammed full.

—Mr. John Coote, city, was thrown out
of his buggy at the corner of Richmond and
Dundas streets yesterday, owing to the
collapse of a wheel while turning out of the
street east tracks. P. C. Egerton captured
the horse, and Mr. Coote escaped with a
shaking up.

—The city council, the warden and county
council, the different civic bodies and citi-
zen generally, will be invited to attend the
opening of the Collegiate Institute on
Wednesday next, when the M. C. R. of
Education will speak. Proceedings begin
at 2:30 p.m.

—A convention is called of temperance
workers for the east riding of Middlesex,
to meet in the W. C. T. U. Hall, this city,
on Thursday, Sept. 28, at 1:30 p.m. All
who are interested in the question of pro-
hibition and the vote on this question to be
taken in January next are specially in-
vited to attend this convention.

John Conn, the lad who is charged with
breaking into Robertson's stationery store,
East London, was dismissed, as no one
appeared against him. Dan Simons was
caught begging from Dundas street mer-
chants. He was allowed to go. Wm. Brown,
for beating his way on a G. T. R. passenger
train, was fined \$5.

Death of an Old Railway Employee.
John Robinson, master mechanic of the
Lake Shore, died in Buffalo Tuesday
at 82. He was born in England and had
been in the service of the London and Southwestern
for several years, came to this side of the
water in 1860, going to work for the Great
Western Railway of Canada in August,
1862. In April, 1883, he went to the Grand
Trunk, and in September, 1888, went with
the Lake Shore as engineer at Adrian, re-
maining with that company up to the time
of his death.

Rad Mishap to a Wheelman.
A Delaware telegram of yesterday's
date says: "S. J. Schulte, secretary of
the Toronto Bicycle Club, was picked up on
the Longwood road, about one mile from

Delaware village by a squaw at 10 a.m.
His wheel was broken off at the
fork and his face was badly bruised.
His head cut and his neck injured. The
blood was dry on his face and he appeared
to have lain there for about three hours. He
was brought to Mr. Jarvis' hotel, Dela-
ware village, by the squaw, and his injuries
dressed by a physician. At about 1
p.m. he became conscious enough to say he
was a reporter for the Empire, Toronto,
and that his father's name was Rev. Dr.
Schulte, of St. Thomas. It is supposed
that while riding down a steep hill he
lost control of his wheel."

An Interesting Visitor at the Fair.
An interesting visitor at the Western
Fair yesterday was Master Frank Fleming,
of Bellingham, who has charge of the distri-
bution of the ADVERTISER in that town.
He is 14 years of age, and by a railroad
accident seven years ago he lost his left
arm at the shoulder and his right arm at
the elbow. With the portion of the right
arm left him he carries and distributes his
papers with the utmost regularity. He
can also write, use a fork and spoon and do
many things which would appear im-
practicable to one so disabled. A bright,
cheery little fellow he is, and a favorite
with all. He has a life pension of \$1 a day
and a perpetual free pass over the railroad.

Fell Down a Well.
Early yesterday a serious accident
occurred to Mr. J. B. Leigh, of J. B. Leigh
& son, plumbers, who was inspecting some
proposed work for J. R. Gurd at the
broom factory, London West. The place
was dark and he fell into an uncovered
well, but was fortunately caught by a pro-
jection midway before reaching the bot-
tom. To this he clung instinctively and
remained until rescued. He was uncon-
scious when brought to the surface. Dr.
George Wilson was summoned by tele-
phone, and Mr. Leigh was removed to his
residence near by. Some of his ribs
are broken and other internal injuries are
feared.

ceremony being performed by Rev. Chas.
Seaman, father of the groom. The bride

Seaman, organist of St. John's Episcopal
Church. The bride looked very pretty and
graceful in a handsome traveling gown of
navy blue and tan, with hat and gloves to
match. The bride, on the arm of her
father, entered the church preceded by the
usher, Dr. Walter H. Kidder, of Buffalo,
and Mr. Wm. Jarman, of London, Ont.,
and was met at the altar by the groom and
his best man, Rev. F. E. Dark. The bridal
party had a rehearsal at the church on
Monday evening, and the wedding was
conducted by the choir of St. John's Church,
who sang "The voice that breathed o'er
Eden" as the procession passed up the aisle,
and escorted them to the carriage, singing
