AT VALLEYFIELD

The Union Had Nothing to Do Two Anti-Foreign Chinese With the Strike or Row.

Statement of the Company-Report That Mill Hands Mave Joined the Striking Laborers.

Valleyfield, Que., Oct. 26.-All the cotton mill hands, to the number of 2,700, have joined the strikers, and the mills are closed down. The decision of the operatives complicates the difficult and serious situation.

The local labor union, through its treasurer, Mr. Dechene, denies that it has had a hand in the strike. people," he said, "have an interest in fomenting trouble, and have supplied the strikers with whisky, and now they are trying to drag our union in. We have nothing to do with it, however, and instead of encouraging the strike we have tried to dissuade the men

At 11:45 p.m. there is no sign of hostilities. Up to this writing the riot act has not been read, all the justices of the peace steadfastly refusing to comwith requests that it be read. Montreal, Oct. 26 .- Mayor Langevin, of Valleyfield, arrived in Montreal at 9:45 o'clock this morning. Two hours dater Mayor Langevin returned to Valleyfield. "If I am asked to read the riot act I shall do so," declared Mr. Langevin to a reporter at the Bonaventure station, "even if I leave my dead body there as a result."

With regard to the report that he had refused to read the riot act when the mob assailed the militia, Mayor Langevin declared that he had made no re-fusal to do so. He was never asked by any officer or by any other official to read the riot act.

ALL QUIET THIS MORNING. Valleyfield, Que., Oct. 27-1 a.m.-At this hour everything is quiet. Another detachment of militia, c sisting of 100 rank and file of the th Rifles, Montreal's French-Canadian corps, arrived last evening, and were run right into the mill property before disem-barking from the cars.

THE COMPANY'S STATEMENT. Valleyfield, Que., Oct. 26. - A statement was issued by the Montreal Cotton Company this afternoon regarding the strike of the men employed on the excavations and foundations of the new mill. On Monday last some of the men struck, pending an increase in pay of 25 per cent. The company decided it could not grant the increase demanded, but expressed itself as willing to consider a nine-hour day instead of a tenhour day as a full day during the fall season. The strikers, however, refused to accept this, and remained out. London, Oct. 27.-Emperior Nicholas, says the St. Petersburg correspondent of the Daily Mail, "has received a letter from the Chinese emperor, asking him to take the conquered Manchurian provinces under Russian protection."
A St. Petersburg dispatch says: The remains of the Chinese troops in wide spaces of country around Muk-den (Manchuria), says Russian official dispatches, are broken up into guerilla bands, which are plundering villages and farms. Three explosions, which occurred at Mukden, Oct. 10, whereby 26 Russians were wounded, were deliberately carried out by the Chinese while the Russians were engaged in destroying the contents of a powder

magazine.

With reference to the report of the fighting in the German hinterland of Kiao Chou, the German foreign office has received reports that the attitude of Kwang Shi Kai has not given occasion for complaint lately, and that the anti-foreign agitation in the Pro-vince of Shan Tung is now considered

quelled.

The death of Kang Y1, which is confirmed, is an important event, as he was one of the ringleaders whose punishment was demanded by the powers. Although the dispatch says only that Kang Yi "dled" on the 18th inst., it is thought that his "death" was the natural result of the disgrace which has overtaken the anti-foreign and Boxer element. BET. Lyons, Oct. 27.-The Nouv Elliste de Lyon says a plot to assassinate President Loubet has been discovered. It appears that a working electrician named Couturier entered the electric company's premises at Nimes and stole 2,500 francs. He was tracked to Orange, near Lyons, where he was ar-rested. Documents found on his person revealed, the paper says, an anarchist conspiracy to assassinate President Loubet on his coming visit to Lyons to unveil a monument erected to the memory of President Carnot. Couturier has, it is added, confessed to the police, who are now tracking his accomplices.

LORD ROSSLYN "ROILED." A special from London says: Lord Rosslyn has taken serious exception to some of the remarks made by Winston Churchill upon some statements in his new book, "Twice Captured," In a lef-ter to the Daily Mail.
