Wogack | has refused to accept Count Von Waldersee's arbitration at Tien Tsin," says the Pekin correspondent of the Daily Mail, wiring yesterday, "and demands that the British not only withdraw, but apologize for removing the Russian flag. Gen. Barrow refuses to do either, and in so refusing has the support of the British Government. British reinforcements are being sent."

> UNDER ARMS. A Tien Tsin dispatch says: In addition to the Australians, outposts from the lines of communication are coming in to be ready in case of necessity. The British are under arms to prevent the settlement being rushed, but they do not anticipate such

ENGLAND EXPECTED TO YIELD. A Berlin dispatch says: In German official circles it is asserted that British and Russian guards still occupy the land in controversy at Tien Tsin, and that a satisfactory adjustment of the matter may be expected. press does not consider the Tien Tsin incident vital. All the papers express belief that Great Britain will yield. The Vossische Zeitung says that England cannot now afford to engage in a serious conflict with Russia.

RUSSIAN PRESS OPINION. St. Petersburg, March 20.-The Russian press is not alarmed about the Tien Tsin affair. There is no mention of it in the official agency's dispatches, but the London correspondent of the Novoye Vremya characterizes the dispute as unimportant. Another London correspondent quotes French diplomat as saying that an Anglo-Russian war is impossible, as Russia need only threaten to support the Boers in order to bring Great Britain upon her knees. FACTIOUS FRENCH TROOPS. Pekin, March 20 .- The British reinforcements, consisting of 90 marines, which arrived at Tien Tsin last night from the Taku forts to replace the Indian guards on the disputed lands, are explained as due to a fear lest any incident arising out of the Russo-British land question should cause the French troops, whose conduct has given much trouble, to precipitate a collision. The British commanders desire to have enough troops in Tien Tsin to preserve order in the streets. Gen. Bailloud left here this morning to inquire into the conduct of the French troops at Tien Tsin. At today's conference of the foreign ministers general matters only were discussed and no conclusions were arrived at.

JAPANESE FLEET MOBILIZING. Shanghai, March 20.-A dispatch to the China Gazette from Tokio, March 20, says that all the Russian warships in Japanese waters have sailed for Corea, and that the Japanese squadron is mobilizing for an immediate departure to the Corean coast.

OPENLY AGGRESSIVE. London, March 21 .- "Russia's proceedings in Corea," says the Kobe correspondent of the Daily Mail, "are now openly aggressive, and it is believed that she is about to make further demands in connection with Ma San Pho. RUSSIA'S MODIFIED TERMS. London, March 20.-Dr. Morrison,

wiring to the Times from Pekin, says: 'Prince Ching received me today, Russia's modification of the Manchurian convention. The Chinese minister at St. Petersburg officially reports that Russia has agreed to eliminate the clause granting her exclusive privileges in Mongolia and Turkestan, and also to modify various other clauses objected to by China. Prince Ching warmly appreciates the assistance but he is not optimistic concerning the return of the court to Pekin. The Russian amendments do not seem to modify sensibly the character of the convention as creating a permanent protectorate. The amendment clause. giving Russia the right to construct railway joining the Manchuria line to the Great Wall, declares that the concession of the railway between Shan Hai Kwan and Niu Chang to a foreign company was a breach of a previous agreement between China and Russia. No agreement has hitherto been published with which that concession could conflict, and it is evident there have been a series of such secret agreements, beginning with the secret treaty which Li Hung Chang negotiated during his mission to Russia in 1896. I questioned Prince Ching concerning this treaty, and he assented to my suggestion of its existence without the slightest demur. Striking Convicts in the Lansing Mines

Are Back in Penilentiary. Leavenworth, Kan., March 20 .- Two convicts of the Lansing Penitentiary were wounded last night by the guards who went down into the penitentiary mine to subdue the 284 prisoners who entered the colliery Monday, and refused to come out until their demands for better food should be granted. All the convicts were run down in various parts of the workings by a heavy detail of guards who descended the shaft shortly before midnight. A volley was fired when the bottom was reached, with the intention of intimidating the mulineers.
