Conclusion of Two Weeks' Mis-
sion at St. Peter's Cathedral.

Rev. E. B. Lancelley Preaches Ann-
versary Services in West London

Yesterday was Palm Sunday, and in
the Catholic Churches the day was
observed by the distribution of palms.
The Long Gospel was read, the con-
gregations standing throughout. At St.
Peter's Cathedral the two weeks' mis-
sion, conducted by Rev. Father McDevlin,
was concluded. At the 10:30 mass, 32 adults were con-
firmed by the bishop. A large number
of the most devout in the afternoon
