#### HAY CHIEF OFFERING ON THE LOCAL MARKET

#### A Very Strong Demand for Oats Today—Big Market Expicied Tomorrow.

There was a very small turnout at the local market this morning, hay being the only commodity offered in any qantity, and even it was not very greatly in evidence. There was a very strong demand for it, and it sold very readily, \$14 50 to \$15 being the prevailing price, though some loads of poorer quality went at a lower figure. Poorer stuff went as low-as \$1 22.
