Jury Brought in Verdict at Inquest Held Last Night at Police Station.

That William Schaefer came to his death at Victoria Hospital on the evening of Sept. 11, 1912, from having taken a dose of carbolic acid with suicidal intent, when under the influence street, a resident of this city for over of liquor, was the verdict rendered last

> The evidence of four witnesses was heard at the police station by Corone Maclaren, Mrs. Schaefer, the wife of the deceased; Dr. F. P. Drake, who onducted the post-mortem examinaion; James McNaughton, who found Schaefer on the street, and Henry Hall, a bartender at the Walper House, who saw the man shortly after his condition was discovered, giving testi-

Mrs. Schaefer testified that her husband had been on a debauch for several months, but knew nothing concerning his intention to take carbolic

Carbolic Acid. Dr. Drake submitted the report on the autopsy, which showed that death was due to carbolic acid poisoning The mouth, throat and stomach were badly burned.

Mr. James McNaughton swore that while standing on the corner of Carling and Talbot streets he saw Schaefer reel and fall to the sidewalk. Naughton rushed up, and while Schaefer frothed at the mouth, it was thought that he was merely suffering from continuous intoxication. He was accordingly carried to the loft of the Walper House stables, the intention being to allow him to sleep off his con-dition. However, shortly afterward it was feared by Henry Hall and others that Schaefer would die, and the poognized that something was wrong, and drove directly to Victoria Hospital with Schaefer, who died shortly after being admitted. But the Water Coms. See No Good in Discussing Street Lighting Now.

### TANGLE OVER WATER

Less Is Used for Street Watering Now That the Council Are Oiling the Streets of London.

The board of water commissioners, at a meeting held on Thursday afternoon, declined to meet the city council in a body to discuss the street lighting contract for 1912, but appointed Messrs. Pocock and Glaubitz a delegation to meet the conucil, if the gentlemen named so

It was the unanimous opinion of the

board that discussion on their part on this subject was absolutely useless, as the decision of the Hydro-Electric Power Commission was final. The invitation had been received from the city council for the commissioners to attend the council session in a body. The invitation was indefinite as to time and place, Mr. J. H. Chapman pointed out, but for the sake of courtesy, more than to discuss business matters, Messrs. Pocock and Glaubitz were delegated with power to attend the session and deal with he situation as they saw fit.

Lights for School.

Manager Glaubitz had also a communication from the board of education, renuesting the water commissioners to install cluster lights in front of the Alex-andra school, to be lighted on the nights when the industrial classes are in ses

Mr. Glaubitz reported that the installation of two five-cluster lights would cost \$160, and \$60 for two of the two single lights. He was instructed to meet the poard of education and endeavor to have that body bear the cost of the posts and the installation, and half of the cost of power, as the public library and other institutions do.

Less Water Used.
City Clerk Baker sent a communication asking a reduction of \$1,000 in the
cost of water for street watering. This
reduction had come about owing to the great area of streets which had been oiled during the year, but the commis-sion, through an oversight, had not been notified of the change, and were now asked to take some action in the mat-ter. The communication also stated that a greater decrease in the amount of water needed by the city may be looked for next year, in proportion to the num-ber of streets which will be oiled.

No Reduction Now.
Commissioner Chapman thought that
oothing could be done at this season of the year. The letter relating to the re-duction, and which had not been received by the board, had been dated in March. and accordingly no allowance had been made for the reduction. Mr. Chapman was willing to recognize the change and take action from this time forward. After considerable discussion the mat-ter was left in Manager Glaubitz's hands,

Industrial Education in London is Meeting With Great Success -Course Has Been Much Improved—A Small Increase in Fees Has Been Rendered Necessary.

At a special meeting of the board of education held yesterday

afternoon the report of the industrial advisory committee was adopted as read by Chairman W. W. Gammage. In order to accommodate the number of pupils entered for the courses in the evening industrial classes, the committee decided to hold classes on Monday, Tuesday, Wednesday and Thursday evenings of each week. Last year there were classes on only three nights

holding of classes on another night. The new courses added are building construction, shop mathematics, pattern making, millinery, and mathematics to prepare for the courses in mechanical and architectural drawing, which will be separ-

each week, but the addition of several other courses compelled the

FEES INCREASED. In view of the fact that the course has been enlarged the fees for the terms have been increased, and now are as follows:

One night a week, 50 cents per month; \$1.00 for three months fall term; \$1.50 for four months spring term. Two or three nights a week, \$1.00 per month; \$2.50 for three months fall term; \$3.00 for four months spring term. Four nights a week, \$1.25 per month; \$3.00 for three months fall term; \$4.00 for four months spring term.

MORE TEACHERS NEEDED. Owing to the introduction of several new subjects, it will be necessary to employ additional teachers for the school, and also to install more equipment. A power wood-working plant will be added, as provided for in the original estimates, but the installation has been delayed on account of the lack of space. This difficulty has been removed by the renting of the old Colborne street school, the rental of which was fixed at \$800 for the seven months' term, and the board

of education will provide the lighting, heating and janitor. Miss Stewart, of Aurora, was appointed as director of household science in connection with the industrial classes, at a salary of \$800 a year, and has commenced her duties. Part of Miss Stewart's salary will be paid by the Government in proportion to the time taken up

with the evening classes. The salary of Principal Beal was increased \$100 for the additional work done by him during the summer months preparing for the classes.

LITERATURE IS READY.

The literature for the evening classes has just been published, and will be distributed in all the factories of the city. Each firm has a supply of reply cards, and will give one to each employee. The registration for the night classes is now going on, and already a large number of last year's pupils have re-entered. The attendance at the day classes at present is 36.

A communication from the Deputy Minister of Education was read, stating that a grant from the Dominion Legislature to each province is expected soon for the support of the different industrial classes, and requesting that the estimates of the cost of the classes in London be sent to the department as early as possible, so that the proportions of the different schools may be allotted as soon as con-

### COMMERCIAL CLASSES.

The commercial evening classes were discussed in an informal manner, and it was stated that the average attendance last year was
