CARBOLIC ACID CAUSED WM. SCHAEFER'S DEATH
Jury Brought in Verdict at Inquest Held Last Night at Police Station.

That William Schaefer came to his death at Victoria Hospital on the evening of Sept. 11, 1912, from having taken a dose of carbolic acid with suicidal intent, when under the influence of liquor, was the verdict rendered last evening by the jury, which under Coroner Dr. MacLaren, conducted the inquest.
The evidence of four witnesses was heard at the police station by Coroner MacLaren. Mrs. Schaefer, the wife of the deceased; Dr. P. P. Drake, who conducted the post-mortem examination; James McNaughton, who found Schaefer on the street, and Henry Hall, a bartender at the Walper House, who saw the man shortly after his condition was discovered, giving testimony.
Mrs. Schaefer testified that her husband had been on a debauch for several months, but knew nothing concerning his intention to take carbolic acid.
Dr. Drake submitted the report on the autopsy, which showed that death was due to carbolic acid poisoning. The mouth, throat and stomach were badly burned.
Mr. James McNaughton swore that while standing on the corner of Carling and Talbot streets he saw Schaefer reel and fall to the sidewalk. McNaughton rushed up, and while Schaefer frothed he knew nothing of the cause of his condition. He was thought that he was merely suffering from continuous intoxication. He was accordingly carried to the left of the Walper House, where he was found lying on the ground, his condition being to allow him to sleep off his condition. However, shortly afterward it was feared by Henry Hall and others that Schaefer would die, and the police were summoned. Dr. Drake, of the patrol, who is a first-aid man, recognized that something was wrong, and drove directly to Victoria Hospital with Schaefer, who died shortly after being admitted.
Coroner MacLaren ordered Dr. Drake to perform a post-mortem examination, and the true cause of death was thus discovered.

THREE DEATHS
Infantile Paralysis Is Spreading Through Niagara Falls Families.

Niagara Falls, Sept. 19.—Infantile paralysis has claimed another victim in this city. Evelyn Grace, the 5-year-old daughter of Charles W. Campaigne, of the Niagara House, Niagara Falls Centre, was the victim. Her death occurred yesterday, and the funeral was almost immediate, under the orders of the city health officers. This is the third victim of the malady since the disease broke out here. The child had been sick but a few days.

MAY BE PRESENT OUT OF COURTESY
But the Water Coms. See No Good in Discussing Street Lighting Now.
A TANGLE OVER WATER
Less Is Used for Street Watering Now Than the Council Are Oiling the Streets of London.

The board of water commissioners, at a meeting held on Thursday afternoon, declined to meet the city council in a body to discuss the street lighting contract for 1912, but appointed Messrs. Pocock and Glauzitz a delegation to meet the council, if the gentlemen named so desired.
It was the unanimous opinion of the board that discussion on their part on this subject was absolutely useless, as the decision of the Hydro-Electric Power Commission was final.
The invitation had been received from the city council for the commissioners to attend the council session in a body. The invitation was indefinite as to time and place. Mr. H. Chapman pointed out, but for the sake of courtesy, more than to discuss business matters. Messrs. Pocock and Glauzitz were delegated with power to attend the session and deal with the situation as they saw fit.
Manager Glauzitz had also a communication from the board of education, requesting the water commissioners to install cluster lights in front of the Alexandra school, to be lighted on the nights when the industrial classes are in session.
Mr. Glauzitz reported that the installation of two five-club lights would cost \$150, and \$60 for two of the two single lights. He was instructed to meet the board of education and to have that body bear the cost of the posts and the installation, and half of the cost of the power, as the public library and other institutions do.

CLASSES WILL BE HELD FOUR NIGHTS A WEEK
Industrial Education in London is Meeting With Great Success—Course Has Been Much Improved—A Small Increase in Fees Has Been Rendered Necessary.

At a special meeting of the board of education held yesterday afternoon the report of the industrial advisory committee was adopted as read by Chairman W. W. Gammage.
In order to accommodate the number of pupils entered for the courses in the evening industrial classes, the committee decided to hold classes on Monday, Tuesday, Wednesday and Thursday evenings of each week. Last year there were classes on only three nights each week, but the addition of several other courses compelled the holding of classes on another night.

The new courses added are building construction, shop mathematics, pattern making, millinery, and mathematics to prepare for the courses in mechanical and architectural drawing, which will be separate courses.
FEES INCREASED.
In view of the fact that the course has been enlarged the fees for the terms have been increased, and now are as follows:
One night a week, 50 cents per month; \$1.00 for three months fall term; \$1.50 for four months spring term. Two or three nights a week, \$1.00 per month; \$2.50 for three months fall term; \$3.00 for four months spring term. Four nights a week, \$1.25 per month; \$3.00 for three months fall term; \$4.00 for four months spring term.
MORE TEACHERS NEEDED.
Owing to the introduction of several new subjects, it will be necessary to employ additional teachers for the school, and also to install more equipment. A power wood-working plant will be added, as provided for in the original estimates, but the installation has been delayed on account of the lack of space. This difficulty has been removed by the renting of the old Colborne street school, the rental of which was fixed at \$300 for the seven months' term, and the board of education will provide the lighting, heating and janitor.

Miss Stewart, of Aurora, was appointed as director of household science in connection with the industrial classes, at a salary of \$500 a year, and has commenced her duties. Part of Miss Stewart's salary will be paid by the Government in proportion to the time taken up with the evening classes.
The salary of Principal Beal was increased \$100 for the additional work done by him during the summer months preparing for the classes.
LITERATURE IS READY.
The literature for the evening classes has just been published, and will be distributed in all the factories of the city. Each firm has a supply of reply cards, and will give one to each employee. The registration for the night classes is now going on, and already a large number of last year's pupils have re-entered. The attendance at the day classes at present is 36.
A communication from the Deputy Minister of Education was read, stating that a grant from the Dominion Legislature to each province is expected soon for the support of the different industrial classes, and requesting that the estimates of the cost of the classes in London be sent to the department as early as possible, so that the proportions of the different schools may be allotted as soon as convenient.

COMMERCIAL CLASSES.
The commercial evening classes were discussed in an informal manner, and it was stated that the average attendance last year was 91 each night.
Next year diplomas will be given to all the successful students so that they may be able to produce their qualifications when desired. Principal F. W. C. McCutcheon will visit Stratford and Toronto in order to inspect the schools there and report at the meeting of the committee on Sept. 27.
The motion of Rev. J. G. Inkster, that the grant of \$125 per month towards the supervised playgrounds, be continued until the end of November, was adopted by the board. It is possible that the Y. M. C. A. will take over the supervision of the playgrounds for the balance of the season.
Those present at yesterday's meeting were Chairman J. M. Gunn, E. R. Dennis, J. G. Inkster, W. W. Gammage, A. M. Hunt, Dr. Mugan, and Secretary McElhennan.
