NAMING RUSS JEWS.

St. Petersburg, Jan. 30.—There is nothing in the Russian law to prevent Russian subjects of the Jewish faith naming their children as they please, according to a ruling laid down by the Russian Senate last evening. The ministry of the interior had asked the Senate to give a decision on the subject owing to the growing custom among Russians of this religious sect of assuming ordinary Russian first names, and conferring them on their children, instead of the Old Testament names hitherto used by them.
