C. P. R. REFUSED TO JOIN THE POOL

Prospects of a Lively Atlantic Rate War From Trieste.

Berlin, Jan. 30.—The North Atlantic steamship conference, which began its sittings here on Tuesday, ended abruptly today when the Canadian Pacific Railway refused to join the pool. The other members unanimously decided to renew the combination, and there is a prospect of a lively rate war for steamer business from Trieste.

A statement was given out by the conference, declaring that the lines represented failed to reach an agreement with the Canadian Pacific and decided to continue without that company's co-operation.

QUASH INDICTMENT AGAINST NESBITT

H. H. Dewart, K. C., Made Motion Yesterday in Criminal Assizes.

Toronto, Jan. 31.—Mr. Hartley H. Dewart, K. C., made a motion for the quashing of the indictment against Dr. William Beattie Nesbitt yesterday afternoon at the closing of the criminal assizes before Mr. Justice Middleton, acting on specific instructions from Mrs. Nesbitt. Dr. Nesbitt is charged with making fraudulent returns to the Minister of Finance in connection with the defunct Farmers' Bank. No definite action was taken, the court being adjourned until Feb. 10, but his lordship intimated that he might be able to hear the argument some afternoon next week. Mr. W. G. Thurston, crown counsel, contended that even a motion to quash could not be argued until the accused could be arraigned in court. But said that it was not the policy of the crown to place obstacles in the way of redress for a prisoner. He was content that the court should be adjourned until he, or whoever, might be able to reach an agreement with the Minister of Finance in the matter from the Attorney-General.

HOTELS CLOSING

Temperance People Will Provide Accommodation at Galt Shortly.

[Special to The Advertiser.] Galt, Jan. 30.—A. J. Cardy, owner of the Imperial Hotel, today stated that he had given the tenant of the hotel W. L. Lefavor, until March 1 to vacate the premises, and that after that date he intended to hold an auction sale of the contents of the house and would close up the hotel, as at present it was a losing proposition. The contents of the Imperial Hotel are also on the market for sale, and the property is for rent. If these two hotels are closed Galt will be practically without hotel accommodation until the temperance people complete arrangements for a local option hotel.

NAMING RUSS JEWS.

St. Petersburg, Jan. 30.—There is nothing in the Russian law to prevent Russian subjects of the Jewish faith naming their children as they please, according to a ruling laid down by the Russian Senate last evening. The ministry of the interior had asked the Senate to give a decision on the subject owing to the growing custom among Russians of this religious sect of assuming ordinary Russian first names, and conferring them on their children, instead of the Old Testament names hitherto used by them. The protest of the Holy Synod against this permission being given has therefore been ineffective, and cannot be enforced without the introduction of new legislation.

MAY VOTE SINGLE TERM FOR U.S. PRESIDENTS

Plan To Head Off Roosevelt From Returning to the White House.

Washington, Jan. 30.—A day's debate in the Senate on the resolution proposing a single term of six years for the President and making the chief executive ineligible to succeed himself brought forth two important developments. The Senate went on record overwhelmingly against the recall of presidents at biennial elections, and President-Elect Wilson was committed by Senator James Martin, of his own state, to advocacy of a single term in the White House.

The Senate did not reach a vote on the main proposition, and the debate will be resumed tomorrow morning. Several important amendments have been proposed to the original resolution. Senator Root, of New York, Republican, and Clark, of Kentucky, Democrat, have introduced amendments which provide that the one term limitation shall not apply to presidents who have served prior to March 4, 1917. This will exclude both Col. Roosevelt and Woodrow Wilson. A similar amendment has been offered by Senator Dixon, the Bull Moose leader, specifically exempting Woodrow Wilson from the operation of the proposed constitutional amendment. Senator Hitchcock, of Nebraska, has offered an amendment proposing a flat six-year term without succession, to be operative after Mr. Wilson's term expires. His first four years of service, and Senator Owen, of Oklahoma, another Democrat, threw an amendment in the hopper which provides for direct nomination of President by the primary elections of the people.

PEACE HIGHWAY IS PLANNED AT WINDSOR

Proposal To Commemorate the Peace Centenary in a Practical Way.

Windsor, Jan. 30.—Expenditure of \$25,000 as a contribution toward the cost of the proposed driveway along the Canadian side of the Detroit River, advocated as a means of commemorating the peace centenary, will be considered by Essex county council during its present sessions at Sandwich, as the result of representations made to the council this afternoon by a deputation of Amherstburg men. The motion for the expenditure was made by Rev. W. T. Wilkinson.

Following the hearing of the Amherstburg deputation, Mayor Park, F. A. Hough, W. S. Falls, and others acted as spokesmen in urging county support, and Mayor Clay, of Windsor, appeared with them. The plan submitted to the council was for the construction of a driveway as a peace memorial from Amherstburg to the site of the steel plant below Sandwich, a distance of ten miles. The estimated cost for the ten miles is \$35,000.

The county council will deal with the proposal tomorrow or Saturday. It is probable that some steps will be taken in a good roads movement, though the decision of the council may not be expected in line with the plans advocated by the Amherstburg deputation.

GUILTY OF FRAUD

Watford Man Secured Quantity of Cigars Under False Pretences.

[Special to The Advertiser.] Windsor, Jan. 30.—Mr. A. Aziz of Watford, who was arrested recently on a charge of obtaining \$139.05 worth of cigars from M. Eisenberg, a local cigar manufacturer, on false pretences, was today found guilty and remanded until Monday for sentence. Aziz applied for a credit line, and an agency for the cigars in Watford, where he conducts a fruit store. He gave Eisenberg a false statement as to his financial standing when he applied for the agency.

WANTS EXPLANATION

Dominion Alliance Secretary Was Refused Hearing by Montreal Synod.

Montreal, Jan. 30.—John H. Roberts, secretary of the Dominion Alliance, who was yesterday refused a hearing by the Montreal Synod because, as Chancellor Davidson said, of "the chances attaching to this name which it is undesirable that he should appear before the synod," will ask the chancellor for an explanation of his words. "Though the words of the chancellor are very vague, they can be construed into a serious charge, and in justice to myself and the alliance, I am going to ask him to be more explicit," says Mr. Roberts.

DOWN COMES CHIMNEY

Landmark at Wolsley Barracks To Be Removed.

The large brick chimney on top of the boiler room of the Wolsley Barracks is to be razed to the ground on Friday morning. For a period of 26 years this chimney has weathered the elements and overlooked Carleton Place during the times of storm and stress. However, its day of usefulness has been outlived, and the famous gully is to be pulled down. Contractor Wade having the contract. The barracks are now heated by a modern hot water system, and the old steam appliances will be no longer needed.

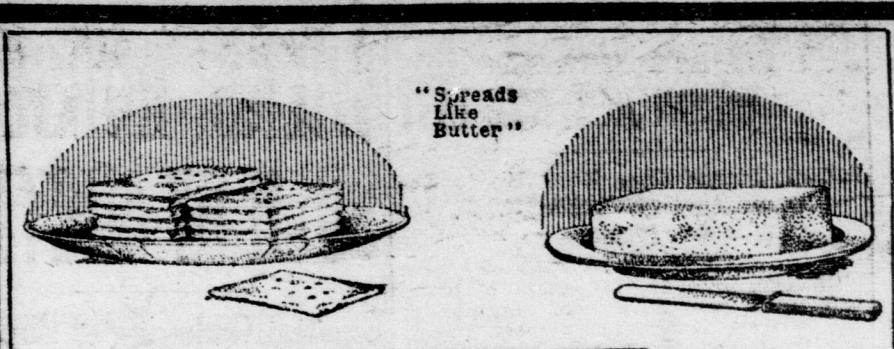
Mrs. R. W. Robertson Is New President of Women's Missionary Society.
