**GLUE FACTORY WIPED  
OUT AT BRANTFORD**

Fire Brigade Unable to Respond  
to Call—Loss Estimated  
at \$125,000

BRANTFORD, May 10.—The main plant of the Canada Glue Factory on the outskirts of this city, was wiped out by fire Saturday evening, causing a loss of \$125,000.

Seventy employees will be thrown out of work.  
The origin of the fire is a mystery, the night watchman having made his rounds a few minutes previous to the outbreak.

**Brigade Did Not Work.**  
Employees endeavored to check the blaze, but without success, and it was impossible for the city brigade to respond to the call.  
The building was of cement construction. The fire did not reach the outer buildings, which contained a big gasoline supply.

**Factory To Be Rebuilt.**  
The loss is covered by an insurance of \$116,000. It is announced that the factory will be rebuilt.

**WAR CORRESPONDENTS  
ARE PLACED IN PRISON**

Canadian Press Man and Three Others  
Prisoners of Mexicans.

VERA CRUZ, May 10.—Walter C. Whiffen, correspondent of The Canadian Press, Sutton, a photographer for the Washington Post, Oliver M. Hueffer, correspondent of the London Express, and another English correspondent, named Rourke, were placed under arrest by the Mexican authorities at Mexico City, Thursday evening. They had just returned from Vera Cruz and the police were waiting with coaches when the train drew into the station.

**Placed in Jail.**  
All were taken to the jail under guard and Messrs. Whiffen and Sutton were held for investigation. The two Englishmen were released, and the officer who arrested them was reprimanded. Later Whiffen and Sutton were set free.

Whiffen carried only a handbag, which happened to contain a copy of the Mexican Herald. The official who searched the bag remarked: "That kind of English does not go here." Sutton carried a camera which was confiscated. He showed a correspondent's credentials signed by Rear-Admiral Badger, but to no effect.

**Demanded Release.**  
Hueffer went at once to the Brazilian minister, who notified the British minister, Sir Lionel Carr, and also called on the police to release the Americans. The police replied that some action would be taken as soon as the chief of police had investigated the merits of the case.

Rourke, the other English correspondent, returned here, while Hueffer remained at Mexico City.  
The British consul here has received no advice and the Brazilian consulate is closed.

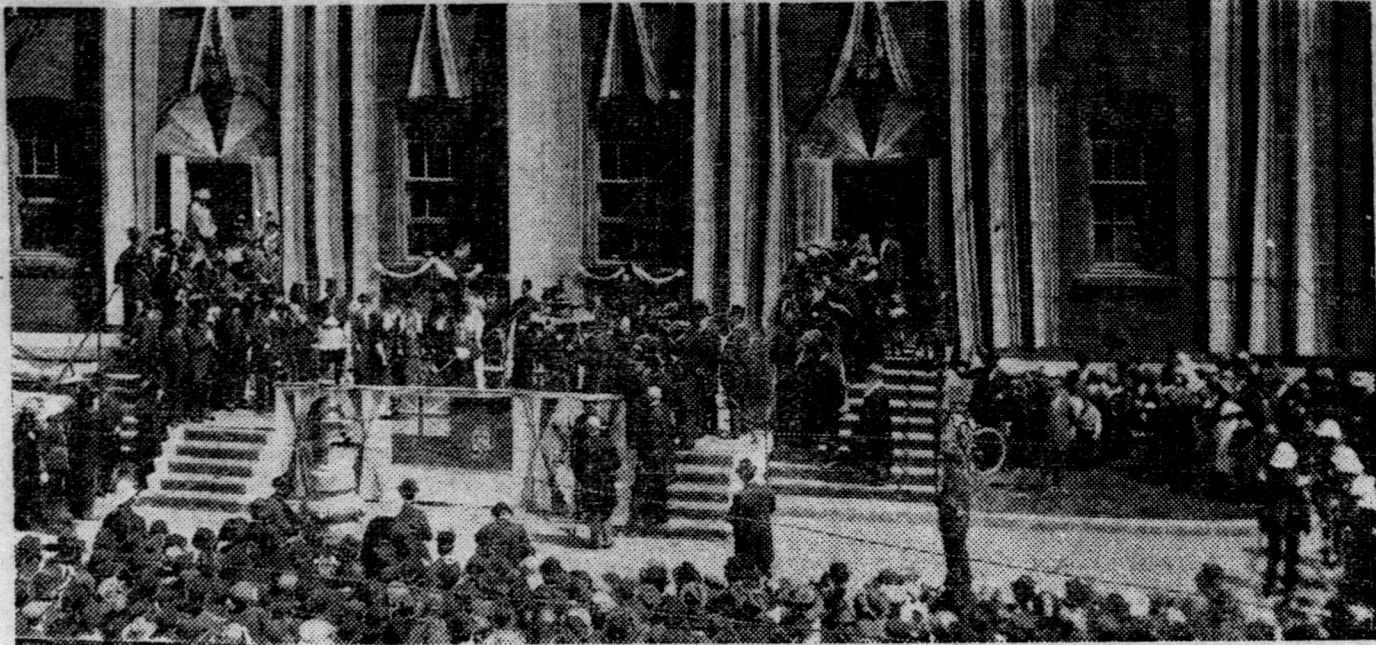

**SOUTH HURON AROUSED; WILL  
NAME TEMPERANCE CANDIDATE**

Hanna's Action Meets With Strongest Disapproval and Will  
Have Its Result at Convention on May 18th—More  
Liquor Ordered.

GODERICH, May 10.—The temperance workers of South Huron have called a convention to meet in Hensall on May 10, and at this meeting steps will be taken to select a candidate pledged to make certain that the bar is removed from the riding.

This is a direct result of the recent breach of faith on the part of Hon. W. J. Hanna, who, after pledging his word to a temperance people that every bar in Huron would go out of business on May 1, deliberately granted three months' extension in Centre and South Huron.

A leading temperance worker, stated to The Advertiser tonight that the organization which secured the biggest majority for the Canada Temperance Act that has ever been won in Ontario will see that a temperance members sits in the house after the next election for South Huron.

**ELECTORS ARE AROUSED.**  
All through the district those who voted to abolish the bar in Huron are up in arms against Mr. Hanna for deliberately frustrating their hard work by playing into the hands of the liquor interests.

It is generally admitted that Mr. Proudfoot will win easily in Centre Huron as a result of what has happened there recently.

Everywhere the most scathing condemnation is to be heard of Mr. Hanna's breach of faith.  
**ORDERING MORE LIQUOR.**  
In Centre and South Huron, instead of the bars being closed, thousands of dollars' worth of liquor is being ordered from the breweries, and all the hotels are doing business as if no monster majority against the liquor traffic had been piled up by the electors.

The convention to be held at Hensall will be attended by every leader in the district. All are aroused to the importance of the matter in hand, and many leading workers declare that Mr. Hanna's attitude has won many votes which in the C. T. A. campaign were cast in favor of the bar.

**NORDICA IS DEAD**

Great Singer Passes Away in  
Java—Will Be Buried in  
the United States.

Batavia, Java, May 11.—The body of Mme. Lillian Nordica, the operatic singer, who died here from pneumonia last night, is to be sent to the United States. It will leave here on May 16, inclosed in a Chinese casket.

**Born in 1859.**  
Mme. Nordica was born at Farmington, United States, in 1859. Her education was received at the Boston Conservatory of Music, where her wonderful voice received its first cultivation.

Her first appearance before a large audience was in La Traviata, in Brescia, London, 1887. Later as Marguerite in Faust she achieved considerable fame for her interpretation of the role.

**Married Three Times.**  
Her first marriage was to Mr. Gower. Later she was married to Herr Dorn, and more recently to George W. Young, a prominent New York banker, by whose name she was known in private life.

Her death was due to a relapse, following an attack of pneumonia, contracted during her removal from the wrecked passenger steamer Tasman last January.

She had intended to retire with a series of concerts to be given in the principal cities of the United States as a conclusion to her world tour.

**"SUFF" BOMB PLACED  
IN SPURGEON'S CHURCH**

LONDON, May 10.—A bomb placed by suffragettes exploded this afternoon in the gallery of the Metropolitan Tabernacle in South London, an edifice made famous by the late Rev. Charles H. Spurgeon.

Little damage was done by the explosion. It is believed that the bomb, a canister containing about two pounds of powder, was placed in the gallery during the morning service, which ended at 12:30 o'clock. An hour later the caretaker in the tabernacle was startled by the explosion.

Near the spot where the bomb exploded was a card on which was written: "Put your religion into practice and see that women obtain their freedom."

**FEDERAL GUNBOAT  
BLOWN UP BY REBELS**

**QUEBEC GIRL IS  
CRUELLY SLAIN**

Nineteen-Year-Old Blanche  
Dubois Struck Down  
With Hammer.

QUEBEC, May 10.—One of the foulest and most brutal murders ever perpetrated in Quebec was committed here this morning in St. Sanguin ward, when Marie Blanche Dubois, aged 19 years, was beaten to death with a hammer in the rear of the shoe store, which was conducted by her brother and herself.

This morning about half past ten o'clock somebody rang the bell at the private entrance. Miss Dubois answered the door and came upstairs, she told her mother that there was a man who wished to change a pair of boots, which did not fit. She took the key to open a door communicating from the passage of the private entrance to the store and evidently let the man in.

**Mother's Awful Discovery.**  
As she had not returned in half an hour, her mother became anxious and called down to her. There was no reply, and the mother, on descending the stairway, found the door leading to the store open. She entered the shop, but could not see her daughter anywhere, and again called her without receiving any answer. Then she opened a door leading to a repair shop in the rear of the main store, and to her horror she saw her daughter lying in a pool of blood.

**CONSULT OTTAWA ABOUT  
PROVINCIAL ELECTION**

Ontario Government Anxious to  
Bring It On Soon, But  
Want Federal Support.

OTTAWA, May 10.—The date of the Ontario provincial elections was considered today by members of the Ontario Government and members of the provincial Government. Messrs. W. H. Hearst and I. V. Lucas reached Ottawa tonight and spent the evening discussing the situation with Hon. Mr. Borden's ministers.

It is understood that they want to hold the Federal elections as soon as convenient, but wish to have the assistance of the 72 members of the Federal House from Ontario in the fight. They are reported to have urged Premier Borden to close the Federal session as soon as possible by either prorogation or adjournment.

**Measure of Aid for MacKenzie & Mann.**  
The measure of aid for MacKenzie & Mann, to which the Government has committed itself is an obstacle in the way of prorogation. The adjournment would be an easier thing, but most unusual. It is understood that there was no conclusion reached as a result of the conference, but that the Government would be a decision come to and announced shortly. With morning sittings starting tomorrow it will be difficult for any of the men from Ontario to leave Ottawa without seriously crippling the Government majority.

**Uncertain of Support.**  
This is especially true as Mr. R. B. Bennett and W. F. Nickle are outspoken against MacKenzie & Mann aid and a number of other Conservative members have threatened to vote against the Government over it.

RENOMINATE ROWELL**

Committed the Act.

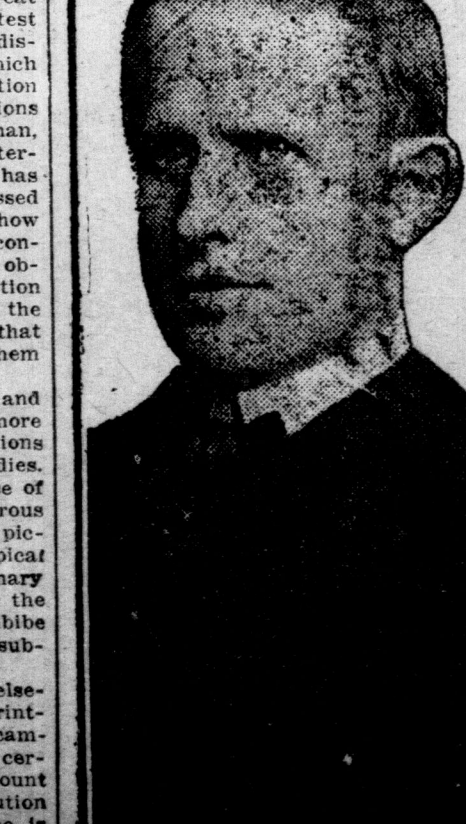

**MEXICAN WAR COST  
TO U. S. IS \$2,701,327**

Transporting of Army Will Reach Mil-  
lion and a Half, According to  
Memorandum.

WASHINGTON, May 10.—The first big memorandum of expense, on account of the Mexican crisis, sent to congress, was submitted today, when the House received estimates aggregating \$2,701,327 for pay, subsistence, supplies, horses, barracks, transportation and engineering work. The troops now at Vera Cruz and on the Mexican border. Congress was asked to make the appropriations immediately.

The largest item is \$1,483,674 for transportation of the army, which is additional to \$464,371 estimated March 17. This amount, the war department says, is required to cover the expense of moving troops, of keeping certain transports in commission, chartering of vessels, purchase of coal, water and of stevedores in connection with chartered vessels and the purchase of additional draft and pack animals required for proper equipment of troops in the field.
