Application to Parliament

Notice is hereby given that an applica-
tion will be made to the Legislative
Assembly of the Province of Ontario,
at the next session thereof, on behalf
of the City Gas Company of London,
of a special Act for the following pur-
poses:1. To amend the Statute of 6 Edward
VII, Chap. 123, passed on the 1st day
of May, 1905, entitled an Act respecting
the City Gas Company of London,
by repealing and striking out Section 7
of the said Act and substituting there-
for the following: "The said Company
shall from and after the passing of this
Act be authorized and empowered to charge
for gas supplied to consumers within the
limits of the City of London, as now
existing, or hereafter extended, at one
dollar and forty cents per thousand
cubic feet of gas, whether used for
illuminating purposes or otherwise, that
is to say, the Company may charge
one dollar and seventy cents for each
thousand feet of gas, subject, however,
to a discount of thirty cents per thou-
sand cubic feet, to which the customer
will be entitled if the amount due by
him from and after the expiration of the
time fixed by subsection 8 of section 37
of the said Act, we shall distribute the
proceeds of the debtors' estate among
the parties entitled thereto, having re-
gard only to the claims of which we
have then notice."2. To amend Section 2 of the said Act,
by striking out the figures "3400,000" in
the fifth line thereof and substituting
therefor the figures "500,000," and
by striking out the words "and amend-
ing the said Act by striking out the
figures \$250,000" in the fourth line there-
of and substituting therefor the figures
"\$100,000," and the said Company
will be to make it lawful for the Company
to increase its authorized capital stock
by \$600,000, and the said Company
may issue of bonds by \$250,000.The reason for requiring the said
amendments is, that the cost of material
and labor has increased to such an ex-
tent that the figures mentioned are
necessary to enable the said Company
to remain in business and supply gas
to the City of London, and the said Company
required further capital to carry on the

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WANTS TO HAVE
GAS FRANCHISE
DECLARED VOIDWindsor Alderman Claims
Border Company Lost When
Rates Were Boosted.

TO URGE COURT ACTION

[Special to The Advertiser.]

WINDSOR, Nov. 18.—Contending that
the franchise held by the Windsor Gas
Company was invalid when natural gas
rates were increased to 50 cents per
1,000 feet without consent of the city
council or consumers, Ald. Wheeler will
ask the council Monday night to cancel
the franchise by court action.The action of Ald. Wheeler is cal-
culated to bring to a head the contro-
versy over natural gas, which has been
going on since war-time regulations
went into effect, making it illegal for
distributing companies to extend their
mains or sell gas to industries.Ald. Wheeler, at a meeting of the In-
dustrial commission of the city council
tonight argued that the company had
violated its franchise in several ways.
Failure to serve all the city, charging
20 cents more per 1,000 feet than al-
lowed by franchise, and other reasons
given by the alderman for cancelling the
franchise."The company," Ald. Wheeler asserted,
"is obligated by its franchise to serve
not one-third of the city, but all
householders who make application for
supply."The action of Ald. Wheeler is cal-

FACES MURDER CHARGE

[Special to The Advertiser.]

TORONTO, Nov. 18.—Mrs. Louise
Leslie, charged with the murder of
Eileen Lyons, the 17-year-old steno-
grapher, who died in the General Hos-
pital here following the effects of an
illegal operation, arrived in Toronto at
8:30 tonight from London, where she
was arrested at her home, 514 William
street, today.The prisoner is a blonde of medium
height and build, and strikingly good
looking, and she appeared very calm
and matter of fact as she descended
from the train in custody of Detec-
tives Murray and McQuinn.On arrival at detective headquarters
at the city hall, Mrs. Leslie remained
calm and collected during her examina-
tion by Inspector of Detectives Guthrie,
although she asked for a glass of
water.

She flatly denied the charge.

After her statement had been taken
she was escorted to Court street sta-
tion, where she will spend the night.On her way from the detective of-
fice Mrs. Leslie started to show signs
of nervousness, and there were tears
in her eyes as she walked to the police
patrol.

Has Been Wed Twice.

Mrs. Leslie has been twice married
and has two children, her first husband
being known by the name of Simmons.In Toronto, where she lived before
removing to London five months ago,
she resided at 185 Church street. Her
first husband kept a grocery store on
Queen street west for some time.Mrs. Leslie originally came from Eng-
land thirteen years ago.Information in possession of the
police is to the effect that the opera-
tion which caused Eileen Lyons' death
took place on Oct. 29 in a hotel on
Queen street east.Mrs. Leslie is alleged to have ad-
mitted that she was in Toronto from
Oct. 29 to Nov. 1, when she returned
to London.A search of the Leslie home in Lon-
don by police, however, failed to bring
to light any instruments such as
might have been used for an opera-
tion of the character which caused the
girl's death.

Albanian Also Held.

John Collins of 228 Lee avenue is also
held by the police in connection with
the case. Collins is an Albanian and
alleged to have been an associate of
Mrs. Leslie when she lived in Toronto.
He was employed in a candy store.Another crown witness will be the
flame of the girl.Information obtained from him has
enabled the police to make the two
arrests and he will probably be called as
a witness against the defendants now
under arrest.All three will be brought to the re-
sumed hearing of the inquest of Eileen
Lyons, which takes place on Nov. 23.

CONDITION SERIOUS

IN NORTH MANITOBA

\$10,000,000 Will Be Re-

quired To Help Western
