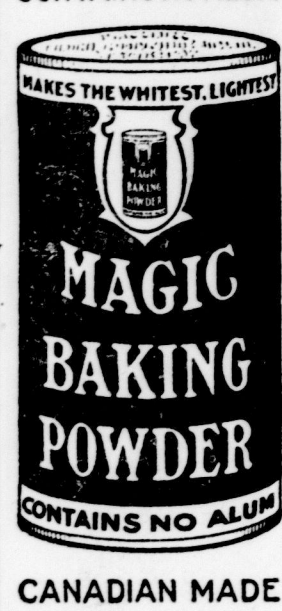

## MICHIGAN MAN TO FACE JURY TRIAL

Carman Mitchell Denied Privilege of Summary Hearing By Order of Attorney-General.

## RANEY SENDS LETTER

Counsel For Defence Gives Notice of Application To Higher Court For Bail.

SARNIA, March 6.—Attorney-General W. E. Raney again today entered the limelight in police court proceedings in Lambton by writing a letter to Police Magistrate J. J. Jarvis ordering that Carman Mitchell, charged with robbery with violence, be refused the privilege of electing summary trial and requiring him to appear before a jury.

As a result of this communication from Attorney-General Raney, Police Magistrate J. J. Jarvis proceeded to hear sufficient evidence to justify a commitment to trial of Mitchell. In accordance with the attorney-general's instructions he will be brought before the court here.

## GENOA PARLEY TO OPEN ON APRIL 10

PARIS, March 6.—April 10 has been definitely settled upon as the opening date of the Genoa conference. Italy, from whom a request for delay had been expected, owing to the extended cabinet crisis last month, informed the foreign office today that she would be ready on that date.

The French government will have five representatives at the opening of the conference, one of whom is quite likely to be Premier Poincaré himself, but for a few days only.

The meeting of the finance ministers of France, Great Britain, Italy and Belgium on March 8, will be merely for the purpose of discussing the distribution among the allied powers of the reparations payments already made by Germany.

Keen interest is taken in the case throughout Lambton County, and it was less than a month ago that Mrs. Carman Mitchell narrowly escaped drowning when she crossed the ice-covered St. Clair river in her effort to secure legal representation for her husband.

## FIGHT RAILWAY BOARD CONTROL RADIAL FARES

Legislature Lays Over Bill Introduced by R. Cooper of Welland.

WOULD REGULATE COST Proposed Measure Scored as Menace to Municipality Agreements.

TORONTO, March 6.—A short debate, which ended in a difference of opinion as to who was responsible for the Nipigon power tangle, a statement by J. McNamara, Independent (Riverdale), on his position relative to the Ontario temperance act, and the second reading of a number of bills took up this afternoon's session of the Ontario Legislature.

Compared with the crossfire which characterized the session Friday, the proceedings today were harmonious. The Nipigon power dispute seems destined to produce some lively argument later on, but today was only a beginner, and the debate consisted of statements by D. M. Hogarth, Hon. Henry Mills of Fort William, and shorter references by Premier Drury and Hon. Howard Ferguson.

Of the bills, several on insurance, based on the report of the insurance commission, were given a second reading and passed on to a committee of the house. The bill to amend the Ontario railway act, which would give power to the existing agreements between street railway companies and municipalities, was left over when it encountered serious opposition.

D. M. Hogarth (Port Arthur) introduced the Nipigon power question before the orders of the day, and went into the history of the trouble. He claimed that Port Arthur and the Nipigon power developed, had entered into an agreement with the hydro commission. Port Arthur, by this agreement, was to take 8,000 or 10,000 horsepower beginning 1926.

Entered Hydro Pact. Representatives of Port Arthur and the Great Lakes Paper Company, in 1919, after a week's negotiation with the hydro commission, reached an understanding to take power at \$17 per horsepower, and later the company reached an agreement with

## Five Revolver Shots Halt Flight of Alleged Window-Peeper.

SARNIA, March 6.—Alleged by the police to be a "Jack the peeper," Albert Dobson is held at police headquarters to-night following his arrest after a patrolman fired five revolver shots at him.

Dobson was said to have been discovered peeping into a window at the home of James McDonald, Eglar street. Mr. McDonald tackled the man, but he broke away. Officer Monroe got to the place in time to make an effort to get hold of the peeper. As Dobson fled Monroe fired five shots and later captured him.

Port Arthur that the mill should be built at Bear Point. "This, he claimed, kindled the jealousy of Fort William, and with the government passing out of existence at the member for Fort William as a minister of the Drury cabinet, the site was changed, and understandings were all broken up. The depression came on and the mill was never built. He charged that the dickering of the present government and the influence exerted by Hon. Mr. Mills had resulted in the province having spent vast sums on power development of 27,000 horsepower for which there was but small use.

The premier explained that the question had been raised unexpectedly, but he would make a statement, perhaps tomorrow, of the government's position in regard to it.

Sergeant Major McNamara read a report that the "Citizens' Liberty League" had sent letters to doctors asking them for contributions to fight the Ontario temperance act, and he interpreted an editorial in a Toronto paper containing this announcement as insinuating that any one who opposed the Ontario temperance act in the Legislature would be in the pay of the Liberty League. McNamara said that he intended to move an amendment in the house to the Ontario temperance act, and defied any one to bring evidence that he was influenced in the slightest degree by the Liberty League or any other league or alliance.

Bill Meets Objection. The bill introduced by R. Cooper of Welland caused strenuous objection in the house. It read:

"Notwithstanding anything to the contrary contained in any agreement with a municipal or other corporation or person, or in any special act, the fare to be taken by a company on a railway operated by electricity shall be such as shall be approved by the (railway and municipal) board, and no fare shall be charged upon such railway which has not so been approved."

K. K. Homuth pointed out that the evil this was intended to meet was where an agreement had been made years ago and the fare charged was obviously too low for the railways to operate today. He instanced the case of the Kitchener and Bridgeport Railway, where both the company and the municipalities were anxious to have the fares increased to enable the company to give adequate service, but fare citizens took out an injunction and prevented it.

However, Mr. Ferguson and W. F. Nickle (Kingston) pointed out that this bill would over-ride every agreement between municipalities and electric railway companies in the province of Ontario.

"It would be the introduction of service at cost," said Mr. Nickle. "Where a company was losing money it would go to the railway board and get the rates increased, and where it was making a large profit the municipality would get the rates cut."

Would Kill Agreement. "That would mean that the agreement of the city of London with the railway company would be of no use," said H. A. Stevenson (London). I certainly oppose this bill."

Attorney-General Raney was anxious to have a bill which would meet the situation described by Mr. Homuth, but not a bill that would supersede all existing contracts, and the bill was left over for further consideration.

The automobile bill was the only one on the insurance list that caused any discussion, and it was given its second reading. Hon. G. S. Henry said the object of the bill was to make uniform policies, and an endeavor was made to protect the companies against dishonest owners of cars who sought to get claims paid that they were not entitled to.

"The auto owners of this province are paying higher insurance rates than they should because of this type of dishonesty piling up the claim total each year," E. Watson of Victoria also endorsed the bill.

A. Strickland suggested that every person driving a car should have to carry automobile insurance, so that if he injured anyone the victim would have an opportunity to collect damages. Many a reckless driver, he claimed, owned nothing but a car, and anyone hurt was unable to collect compensation.

Stevenson suggested that the insurance policy be issued at the same time as the driver's license, and the government get a special rate from insurance companies for this purpose.

This point will likely be discussed further in committee.

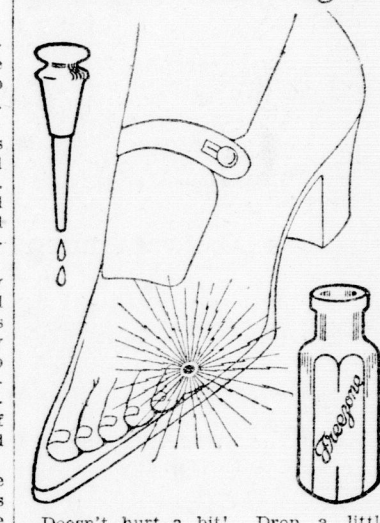
