ALL OFFICES CLOSED

Will Probably Be More Than \$1.500.000 For Canadian Shareholders.

Buffalo, N. Y., May 28 .- The general audit of the L. R. Steel companies, made public here today in bankruptcy court, show assets of \$5,000,000, and claims already filed total more than \$2,000,000, so that only \$3,000,000 remain of the \$26,000,-000 poured into the companies by the investors from Canada and the United The Canadian company has assets amounting to about \$1,500,000, according to G. T. Clarkson, Canadian receiver. The Canadian audit is not yet complete, according to an appendage submitted with the United States audit, and Mr. Clarkson has based his figures on a personal survey of the business.

In explaining the figures contained in the report the receiver said: The receiver believes it appropriate to refer to the assets and liabilities of all the companies connection with the Steel enterprises."

The report continued: "The petitions in involuntary bankruptcy were filed against only two of the companies, because they desire to point out that all of these companies are so intermingled and interlocked that an explanation of any one company would be impossible without refer

Nominated by Lord Curzon to Succeed Bonar Law as Leader.

London, May 28.—Premier Bald-vin was chosen leader of the Conservatives at a party meeting to-day. The meeting was attended by the Conservative members of both the House of Lords and the House of Commons who are supporting the government. It was presided over by Lord Curzon, who moved the election of Mr. Baldwin as leader of the party in succession to Mr. Bonar Law. The foreign secretary's speech felicitated both the party and the premier on the choice. 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
