WHITE JOINS FIGHT OVER COAL TARIFF

Says Meighen Must Have Been Misquoted—Senator Robertson Assists at Meeting.

1,300 HEAR SPEAKERS

Arthur Meighen's Alberta coal policy was stoutly defended at the Grand opera house last night, when J. Frank White, Conservative candidate for London, addressed a meeting of electors. Mr. White appeared as an apostle of all-round protection, and charged that Mr. Meighen had been deliberately misquoted in his Alberta coal statements. The candidate declared that Liberal representation here would make it appear that duty on lump coal would become 140 per cent and on slack coal 240 per cent, which, he said, was not the case.

The meeting was held in the interests of Mr. White, Senator Gideon Robertson, minister of labor in the Meighen government, Miss Constance Bolton, Ontario organizer for Conservative women, and E. B. Ryckman, K.C., Conservative candidate in Southeast Toronto, were amongst the speakers.

Some 1,300 were present, including quite a large following of women. On the platform were 25 or 30 workers of the party. The attendance was considered very encouraging and much confidence was evident throughout the meeting. Enthusiasm was shown for much of the speaking, though the exception accorded to Miss Bolton was, perhaps, more spontaneous than the others.

Other than praise of Conservative policies and criticism of the King government, the great plea of the speakers was for Labor support. Each recounted Labor legislation of Conservative governments and sought the support of workmen because of such records.

Confidence was king, while Mr. White talked about the London contest and while Mr. Robertson described Conservative chances in the west, where he had just spent a couple of weeks with his leader.

the support of the Conservative cause, commented Dr. J. C. Wilson, chairman of the meeting. He lauded the attributes of Mr. White. He thought he was clean and straight. And for one thing, Mr. Little, the Liberal candidate, might have his heart and business in London, but he made his residence in West Middlesex.

Applause greeted the appearance of J. Frank White, Conservative member of the last parliament. He appealed for aid from the ranks of labor, refraining from criticism of John Colbert, the Labor nominee, but attacking class legislation.

Mr. White was offered to learn that The Advertiser thought he was a silent member of the house. He thought he had accomplished quite a lot for the returned men and their dependents and had taken part in the debates of the house. He recalled that The Advertiser had criticized the long-drawn-out session of the parliament this year and had called for whittling down of opposition speeches.

Hits Class Representation.

Condemning class representation, the candidate argued that the Drury government had gone down to defeat because it represented a single group. The Progressive party in the last parliament had accomplished nothing, he said. Only jealousy and suspicion were accomplished by such groups. They were no better than representatives of professional or capitalist classes. "The Labor party can do more by casting its lot with the party that stands by Labor more than anyone else."

Mr. White stated that the Conservative government of Sir James Whitney had instituted the workmen's compensation act, the most favorable piece of legislation for labor in the country.

He declared that the woolen industry of Canada had suffered most by lack of protection. Reduction of duties and minimum wage laws had worked together to the detriment of the industry.

"Now, do not misunderstand me,"

The jewels were turned over to the authorities by Noel Scuffa, a private detective, who said he received them at a conference held October 7, at a local hotel.

Scuffa declared he received the jewels from a man whom he knew only as "Sam Ayton," and whom he had never seen before he met him at the hotel, in compliance with a pre-arranged schedule.

Mr. White hastened to remark, "I'm not opposed to minimum wage laws, but these things are a charge against industry. I think the Conservative platform is broad enough to take in the Labor interests."

Mr. White did not criticize much E. S. Little, Liberal candidate, but he was anxious to know what were Mr. Little's fiscal views.

Mr. White recounted that the farmers in the last parliament had tried to force a reduction in the tariff. He saw scant hope for the woolen, boots and shoes, and agricultural implements industry if protection were not forthcoming. At the same time, Mr. Little's business, that of making socks and hose, was protected by a 35 per cent duty.

Says Others Protected.

The business of Mr. Hyman, one of the tannery supporters, was a tannery, supported by a 10 per cent duty.

Mr. White wondered if Mr. Little and Mr. King would advocate lower tariff for socks and tanning industries in the house. Mr. White referred to the C. N. R. problems and Mr. Massey's entry into politics.

"There's something wrong with the mathematics of Mr. White," they said that Mr. Meighen would increase coal to \$22 a ton in London. They say it can be had down in London for \$8 a ton. At that rate the duty would be 140 per cent on lump coal and 240 per cent on slack coal.

Changes at the London Rolling Mills. Mr. White's firm were extensions of present line of products. The company had thought seriously of quitting business, but Mr. White did not want to throw up the sponge. They had bought a second-hand plant in Toronto, where a firm had been in the business for many years. The plant was being moved to London and set up here for the purpose of manufacturing other lines than are now being produced.

Referring to the rolled steel industry, Mr. White declared that Can-

adian workmen were paid union wages in the absence of protection.

Senator Speaks.

To begin with, the Hon. Mr. Robertson hazarded the opinion that sweeping improvement of the Conservative standing in the house after election day. For one thing, he said, there would be quite easily 20 of the 29 Maritime provinces seats go Conservative. Quebec would return a surprising number of Conservatives, while Ontario would show substantial gains for Mr. Meighen's support. Manitoba would return 10 Conservatives, Saskatchewan 10, and would slide in between fighting Progressives and Liberals. Mr. Robertson ignored Alberta, but said that British Columbia would stand pat.

Senator Robertson praised the high tariff policy of Mr. Meighen as a consistent sequel to the successful policies of MacDonald, Laurier and Borden. While protection had been in force, Canada had prospered. With reduction in the tariff in recent years, employment and hardship had come.

The payroll in the steel industry had dropped from \$20,000,000 to \$7,000,000 a year. Railway earnings were smaller. Thousands of employees had been thrown out of work. "Let us help to get back to the old days when protection and expansion of trade reigned."

Talks of Exodus.

More than half a million Canadians had taken part in the exodus to the United States, nearly 500 a day for four years. A mistaken government policy was blamed.

Last year the government had spent more than \$3,000,000 for European immigrants to replace Canadians lost to the U. S. Some 14 immigration policies and three ministers in the past four years had helped to jumble matters.

Senator Robertson charged that each emigrant from Canada to the United States was fined \$15 at the instigation of the Canadian government. First the government threw men out of work, then fined them for going out of the country.

Protection was set forth by Senator Robertson as the piece de resistance of the Conservative battle. He declared that the men who had reduced the tariff in recent years represented the lowest standard of political morality in the past four years. Reductions in tariff had brought out in the cost of living. Conditions were reverse in the United States. The chemical fertilizer industry had been decimated.

A Welland chemical fertilizer company had been closed up by abolition of tariff. The plant was moved to the United States and reopened. It followed it. The change proved successful.

Fears Annexation.

"We are Canadians first," warmly declared Miss Constance Bolton, Conservative women's organizer. "We are Canadians first, and Conservatives, Liberals and Progressives after."

Miss Bolton told of her amazement during a visit to England in 1923, when she learned that British emigrants were going to the United States, Australia and New Zealand. "Oh, yes, some were coming to Canada," Miss Bolton said. "They were coming to a place called Windsor. There is a place there called Detroit. These people were going into the United States by the back door."

The speaker demanded that the country have economical pressure, without which it would finally come under the rule of the Stars and Stripes.

E. B. Ryckman, K.C., candidate for Southeast Toronto, recounted early days in Middlesex county when the oratory of MacDonald had turned him to the ranks of the Conservative party. He believed that the old-time Liberal party was a wonderful organization, with its Blakes and Lauriers. But today all the good Liberals were Conservatives. Those who were left were members of a King party, which had provided the most barren and futile government in the history of the country.

The statutes of Canada for the past four years showed a record of the blindest performance of any government in the dominion's existence. "They put the seal of his majesty, in effect, on that abominable Petersen contract. That contract was iniquitous, and any other adjective that will put that contract in the rubbish heap, where it belongs."

Although Mr. Ryckman was a despairing pessimist when he considered Canada's future under a Liberal government, he admitted that Providence had been kind in the way of crops.

Laughs At Unity Plea.

He laughed at Mr. King's plea for national unity. The Quebec campaign was the very antithesis of a search for unity. Issues were different. In Quebec the conscription issue was brought up, so much "hunger" was brought up, Mr. Ryckman contended.
