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AN INTERESTING JUDGMENT.

The Chief Justice Finds in Favor of the Victoria Stock Co.

Several Points of Law Expounded—Miss Ramsay's Position Clearly Defined.

Sir Matthew Begbie, sitting in conjunction with Mr. Justice Drake, in the Divisional Court, has delivered the following judgment in the appeal of John E. Rice against the decision of Mr. Justice Crease.

The plaintiff was an actress; the defendant a manager of a theatrical company. An engagement had been entered into, according to which, so far as appeared by the affidavits, the plaintiff was to take leading parts at \$55 per week, payable every Saturday.
