No Trace Of Tracy

But It Is Believed That He Is Concealed In a Seattle Park.

Women Claims to Have Seen Him Late Yesterday Afternoon.

Several Men Arrested For Aiding Desperado in His Escape.

From Our Own Correspondent. Seattle, Wash., July 9.—Nothing new has developed today in the chase after Tracy. After the bloodhounds led the scent last night, where Tracy took to the water of Lake Washington, no further trace of him was discovered until this morning, when the dogs followed his trail some distance, but again lost it.

At 4 o'clock this afternoon a woman living near Leschi Park saw a man sneaking through the brush, and trying to keep his rifle hidden as he walked. She telephoned to the police and men were sent to intercept him, but nothing further has been seen of the man.

It will be necessary for Tracy to obtain food some way, as he lost all he was carrying with him in his wild flight yesterday, escaping with his rifle. It is thought he is between Seattle and Lake Washington, and deputies are guarding every road, so that it is expected he will be seen before he can move very far.

CHARGED WITH AIDING. Seattle, July 9.—Officers from the sheriff's office have arrested Thomas Martin, Philip Jones and Andy Nelson on the charge of aiding Tracy in his escape. The authorities say they have strong evidence to show that they were the men who hid Tracy in the woods last Monday night, as told by Anderson.

HAWAIIAN NEWS NOTES. Claims of Chinamen, Whose Premises Were Burned During Epidemic.

Associated Press Letter by R. M. S. Honolulu, T. H., July 2.—Judge Humphreys of the First Circuit court yesterday rendered a decision in a case of a constitutional an imperious section of the Hawaiian civil code, on the ground that it was contrary to the constitution of the United States. The section in question provided that appeals from district magistrates, who do not hold jury trials, should be to circuit judges in chambers, and that they do not have juries. The judge held that the section was unconstitutional, and that the plaintiff was entitled to a jury trial.
