MUNICIPALITIES MEETING HERE

Fourth Annual Convention to Gather at Council Chambers.

ITS OBJECTS.

The fourth annual convention of the Union of New Brunswick Municipalities will be held in the Council Chambers here on Wednesday and Thursday of this week.

Notwithstanding the fact that the place of meeting is in the most northern town in the province, it is expected that quite a number of delegates will be present, representing most of the cities, towns and counties of the province.

Our town will be represented by Councilors J. M. McLean and M. M. Mowat, supported by the Town Council, and Mayor Murray, who is vice president. The county will be represented by Councilors—Mawhinney, Montgomery and Murchie. The officers and executive for the year are as follows:

President, C. Fred Chestnut, Mayor of Fredericton; vice-president, D. Murray, M. D. Mayor of Campbellton; Hon. Secy. Treas. J. W. McCready, City Clerk, Fredericton.

The objects of the union are:

The general improvement and facilitation of every branch of Municipal Administration by the following means:

—The perpetuation of the organization as an agency for the co-operation of New Brunswick Municipalities in all questions pertaining to Municipal Administration.

—To secure in particular the guidance and improvement of legislation, both of the Dominion and the Provinces upon Municipal questions, and the betterment of Municipal Government and the promotion of Municipal interests generally.

—To hold an Annual Convention for discussion, information and resolutions on the above subjects.

—To secure the securing of unlinked action for the protection of individual Municipalities and Municipal interests as a whole against legislative or other encroachments of corporations.

The speakers at the Convention will be leading civic legislators of the Province of New Brunswick.

The program of this convention was published in a previous issue of the Graphic.

PREPARING FOR THE LEGISLATURE

REV. DR. CARR HAS PASSED TO HIS REWARD

Died Peacefully at His Home Here This Morning.

FREDERICTON, Feb. 14—Premier Hays arrived in the city this morning and will remain for the session of the legislature. Today he is making preparations for the opening ceremonies on Thursday.

Hon. Geo. J. Clark, speaker, is also here today. This evening the members of the provincial government will arrive in the city and tomorrow morning the executive council will meet, and a session will be held every day until the opening of the legislature on Thursday.

Details of arrangements for the opening ceremonies are about completed and there will be all the brilliant occasions in the past. This morning it was announced that Mr. Woods, of Queens, would move the address in reply to the speech from the throne, and Mr. Allan of Northumberland, will second the address. Both are good speakers and the speeches in connection with the opening will be well up to the standard of former occasions.

Two officials in connection with the opening ceremonies will be leaving for the first time, viz. Sheriff Howe and Dr. O. E. Morhouse of Kentville, who will be the attending coroner.

There will be only one person member to be introduced at the opening of the legislature. He is Mr. Bentley of St. John county. In official regard the legislature here will be few changes.

This afternoon Premier Hays will meet Mayor Chestnut who is president of the St. John Valley Railway Company. He will present a statement to the premier regarding the Valley Railway project. Other delegations will probably meet members of the government between now and the opening of the session.

Hon. John Chatham tomorrow will be present at the meetings of the government preliminary to the opening of the session. He will attend the annual convention of the New Brunswick Union of Municipalities at Campbellton on Wednesday as a representative of the government, connected with the opening of the legislature on Thursday afternoon.

Lieutenant Governor Frodip will arrive in Chatham tomorrow. Invitations have been issued for the annual state dinner on the evening of the opening of the session.

Hon. John Chatham tomorrow will be a salute of fifteen guns at the opening of the legislature on Thursday.

The L. C. R. The guard of honor, furnished by H. Company, R. C. R. will be in attendance, under the leadership of Bandmaster Marshall.

WHEN HALLEY'S COMET WILL BE VISIBLE

An Interesting Article About the Great Phenomenon

In the Scientific American of Jan. 1910, John C. Dean, gives the position of Halley's comet, and the sun, as follows:

"During this period (24) the comet will be visible in the western sky, but on Mar. 24, when passing back of the sun, will be invisible for several days. The distance between the earth and the comet at this time will be 166,000,000 miles.

When the comet next emerges from the rays of the sun it will have shifted to the morning sky, rising before dawn and for the first time becoming an interesting object to the naked eye. The earth and comet will now rapidly approach each other and the latter will greatly increase in brilliancy.

About April 20 it will pass its nearest point to the sun and on May 16 will again disappear in the sun's rays. This time, however, passing in the front of the great luminary. It is predicted that the nucleus will cross the sun's disk about five minutes of a degree from its centre, thus furnishing an opportunity to observe whether the models in space in the sun's rays.

The transit will not be visible in the United States as it will occur after sunset here.

On the night of May 15 the earth and comet will rush past each other and the earth will probably sweep through the tail of the comet. They will be only 12,000,000 miles apart. After May 18 the comet will attain its maximum of splendor in the evening sky, and in a few days thereafter its glory will rapidly fade.

The American comet combine is facing the strike of the consumers by proportionally lessening the supply. When every avenue of trade is obstructed by a multitude of restrictions a combine is hard to defeat.

ROYAL CHEF HERE FOR ONE NIGHT

The Royal chef, the brilliant and talented musical comedy from the pen of Ben Jerome, pleased and delighted a large audience at Theatre Albert last night. Until the local audience last night Stratford theatregoers had never had the opportunity of listening to the delightful music and following a model of the picturesque surroundings of mythical Oolong, the very amusing career of the Royal's chef from Chicago, and of the large assisting company of successful and over-busy fun-makers.

That the Royal chef found favour with the audience was evidenced by the continued applause awarded its performance and the inevitable encores which were frequently responded to. The "Story of the Royal Chef" is an engaging one and was well interpreted by the various characters. It is interspersed throughout with smart, witty songs and melodies of a catchy and original nature. A most pleasing feature was the entire absence of any vulgar swag or low jokes as commonly found in so called musical comedies. On the other hand the tone was elevating.

A whole paragraph might be written about Walter A. Holme in his amusing portrayal of Heinrich Leppelbauer "The Royal Chef" from Chicago. The funny situations he creates are most worth provoking. His staging of "Let Me Go Back" was particularly certain calls at the end of the first act, and "In Chicago" and "In the Morning" also were received with entire winning applause. Lena Heinemann is an admirable title actress, possessing marked dramatic talent. She played Kitty O'Reilly in a significantly captivating way that made her a general favorite with the audience. Her rendition of O'Reilly was one of the most prominent features of the musical program. Other leading parts were filled in a most satisfactory manner by Len Chaney as Lord Minto, the transverse pianist, Walter B. Smith as Admiral Noble, Bryn Broome as the Rajah of Oolong, Edith Hinch as Princess Tolo, Chas. Vaughan as Lieutenant Parks and H. Dudley as Holdo, a banter.

While all the musical numbers are exceptionally attractive, the ones most effectively presented other than those mentioned above were "Wishes in which the Royal chef was introduced to great advantage by a comely quartet of four principals; "The Tale of the Tailless Toy," "Santal Love," "When Old Glory Flies from Everywhere," and "A Rajah Bait" etc. The selections given by the quartet proved to be the winning number of the evening and encore after encore was demanded and accorded to.—Stratford Bureau.
