THE DEMANDS OF LABOR. THE CARPENTERS HOLD A BIG MEETING YESTERDAY. Showing That "Union is Strength"—The Street Girl Strikers—The G. T. B. Checkers Stop Work—Fruiters at Belleville. The crisis in the labor market continues to extend. The carpenters are well-handled together and they will fight to the bitter end. The Grand Trunk checkers quit work yesterday. The shoe girls of the city are also determined to have what they consider long-standing wrongs redressed. They are joined in a solid phalanx. All the section men on the Belleville division of the Grand Trunk railway are on strike.

THE CHINESE NOT TO GO. Text of President Arthur's Veto of the Chinese Bill—Passports, Etc., Undermined and Hostile to the "Land of Liberty." WASHINGTON, April 4.—The president's message vetoing the Chinese bill was read and listened to with marked interest and attention by the entire senate. The vital objection of the president is to the twenty years suspension of immigration, which he construed as virtually prohibitory and therefore violative of the spirit, if not of the letter, of the negotiations upon which the treaty was based and as a breach of national faith. The message calls attention to the propositions made by the United States commissioners on this point and to the understanding of the president in honor of the treaty. It is shown that there was a gross injustice in it or that the treaty was not intended to be so interpreted.

THE MURDER OF JESSIE CRAMER. SAN ANTONIO, Texas, April 4.—Lienzo Shearburn, of Dallas, charged with the murder of Jessie Cramer, a young girl, was arrested here today for a charge of murdering Jessie Cramer. The executive committee of the painters union met last night at Dufferin hall to consider the proposal made by the boss painters for a committee of five of the journeymen to make an equal number with the boss painters and confer as to the compromise suggested by the latter.
