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ONE KILLED, THIRTY INJURED.

Express Train Derailed by a Spreading Lumber.

Montgomery, Ala., Feb. 23.—Passenger train No. 1, to New Orleans on the Louisville and Nashville, was wrecked by being derailed two miles south of Montgomery, Saturday morning.

The train was going at the rate of 50 miles an hour, when the rail spread and the tender and engine jumped the track and the combination mail, baggage and express cars were thrown over the embankment and plowed into the mud.

The Pullman left the rails, while the other sleepers and a private car of the C. and A. Railway, with officials on board, remained on the track.

G. B. Walsh of Birmingham, Ala., thought to have been a barber, was killed instantly and nine people were seriously injured.

There were more than 200 passengers aboard, and of that number 80 were more or less injured.

The mail and baggage car, three coaches and two Pullman cars, were burned.

One sleeper and the Chicago and Alton private car escaped the fire, which originated from the stove of the coaches.

THE WOMAN WAS IMPOSED UPON. Signed Away Her All Believing Her Husband Was an Embezzler.

New York, Feb. 23.—Lawyer Charles G. F. Wible made a motion in the Supreme Court, Brooklyn, Saturday, to set aside the verdict in the case of George Gerty of Cleveland, Ohio, who recovered \$100,000 worth of property which she alleges she was forced to sign over to the Standard Oil Company.

He asked permission to inspect the ledger of the company. Mrs. Gerty says she signed over the property to keep her husband from going to prison, under the supposition that he had embezzled \$275,000 from the oil company.

Lawyer Wible told the court that the ledger would show that Gerty was not an embezzler at all. All that he did was done under the instructions of his superior. The lawyer alleged that Gerty took \$187,000 of the company's money at the instance of J. D. Rockefeller and invested it in Government securities, and he was instructed to conduct his transactions secretly. Decision was reserved on the motion.

THE NORWAY CHURCH ENTERTAINMENT. The entertainment given at Boston's Hall on Friday night, in aid of St. John's Church, Norway, was a very enjoyable affair.

"The way to Love" was given as an encore. Then came a fine bit of reading from Miss Hillary, a much-applauded instrumental duet, violin and piano, from "Faust," by Misses Lae and Pearsall.

Miss Edith Dickson's pleasing singing of "Floating Day," and Mr. F. J. Paget's well-received song, "Boys in Blue."

In part II, Miss Hillary carried away the audience with her dramatic reading of a scene in the days of the persecution of the Covenanters.

Miss James sang "The Song of the Violin." "Hunting Tower," sung by Miss Edith-Dickson and Mr. F. J. Paget, gave much pleasure to the audience.

The accompanists of the evening were Miss Pearsall and Mr. G. A. Dickson. Rev. Mr. Starr, the chairman, now made a few appropriate remarks, thanking the audience in behalf of the choir for their presence and ending by introducing the house to the concluding farce, "Turn Him Out."

It would be hard to say which of the performers showed the most histrionic talent. It is enough to say that several among the audience rose to their feet, so interested did they become in the progress of the play, and more than once did some one in the room give full rein to their laughter.
