Among other reports presented was that of the Casual Poor Committee, which stated that from Oct. 14 to Nov. 17, 168 persons had applied for temporary shelter and 653 lodgings had been given. Some "casuals" came in for shelter in the fall and remained all winter, and the committee recommended that those who did should be taken in as residents and reported to the corporation. This

was carried.

Rev. Mr. Baldwin seconded by Rev. Dr. Potts, in order to do away with abuse of the casual shelter arrangement, whereby tramps from all over the country landed in Toronto for the winter, and by applying at night for casual shelter avoided the work residents had to perform, moved that no more than three nights shelter be given in this department during one month, unless the fourth day should come on Sunday. Ald, Jolliffe averred that he was informed by the relief officer that one tramp came all the way from Quebec last year and stayed as a "casual" for 90 consecutive nights. The motion passed.

IN THE CIVIL COURTS.

anceller Boyd Called Upon to Straighter Out the Hobbses Other Important

At the Civil Assize Court yesterday the case of Maclaren v. Dawson was non-suited by Chancellor Boyd. The circumstances of the case are rather peculiar. In 1893 Mrs. Henderson of Huntingdon, Quebec, died leaving \$500 to her nephew, R. H. Hobbs, and the executors located the supposed legatee at Oil Springs and after some correspondence with Dawson and Greenison, lawyers, of that place, the money was forwarded by draft. It transpired that the wrong Hobbs got the money and the executors had to pay another \$500 to the proper Hobbs, for which amount they sued the law firm. Chancellor Boyd's ruling exonerated the Oil Springs lawyers and the executors will have to look to the wrong Hobbs for recompense.

Dempsey v. Imperial Bank was a suit brought by Mrs. Clara Dempsey to recover \$700 which, it is alleged, was paid wrongly on a cheque. Chancehor Boyd ruled that the bank was justified in paying the cheque, and the case was non-suited.

John Cole sued Arthur Green in the Division Court for \$60, alleged damages sustained in a bicycle collision in Dundas-street on Oct. 16th. The action was dismissed without costs, Judge Morson holding that there had been negligence on both sides.

Hunter v. Loftus is a Division Court suit arising through trouble over an insurance policy, the plaintiff claiming misrepresentation. Judge Morson reserved judgment.

Ald. Davies favored a three-years' term for Mayor on the ground of the expenses incurred by elections. He claimed that most of Toronto's mayors and took city's government.

The clause giving the Mayor power to appoint a "cabinet" was not approved of by the committee. It was pointed out by a number of the aldermen that a Mayor might be elected who had no municipal experience, and the Mayor in turn might appoint a cabinet, from amongst his friends, who were as ignorant as himself of city government.


